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1	MR. TUCKER: My name is Bill
2	Tucker with Miners' Health Safety and
3	Training.
4	Today is December the 1st, 2010.
5	If I could get the court reporter
6	to swear in the witness, I'd appreciate
7	it.
8	JIM AUREDNIK, WITNESS, SWORN
9	MR. TUCKER: If you don't mind,
10	Jimmy, I'd like for you to state your
11	name, your full name and spell your last.
12	THE WITNESS: James L. Aurednik,
13	Jr., A-u-r-e-d-n-i-k.
14	MR. TUCKER: And state your
15	address and phone number.
16	THE WITNESS:

19	MR. TUCKER: Do you have a lawyer
20	with you today?
21	THE WITNESS: Yes.
22	MR. TUCKER: Could you identify
23	yourself and the firm that you're with?
24	MR. MCCUSKEY: Yes, sir. John

1	McCuskey with the firm of Shuman McCuskey
2	& Slicer in Charleston.
3	MR. TUCKER: Is Mr. Aurednik your
4	client?
5	MR. MCCUSKEY: Yes, sir.
6	MR. TUCKER: I see we have
7	another attorney in the room today. Would
8	you identify who you represent and your
9	firm and your name?
10	MR. SILKWOOD: Yes, sir. Eric
11	Silkwood with Allen Guthrie & Thomas here
12	on behalf of Performance Coal Company.
13	MR. TUCKER: Jim, are you
14	appearing here voluntarily or did you
15	receive a subpoena?
16	THE WITNESS: I received a
17	subpoena.
18	MR. TUCKER: We've got a copy of
19	that document here. I'll get you to look
20	at it. And also a copy of the paper where
21	it was served to you.
22	Is that what you received?
23	THE WITNESS: I have never seen
24	one of those before.

1	MR. MCCUSKEY: Are you waiting
2	for him?
3	MR. TUCKER: Yeah.
4	You received the subpoena,
5	though? That's the subpoena that you
6	received? Okay.
7	MR. BABINGTON: Is that a yes?
8	THE WITNESS: Yes.
9	MR. TUCKER: Sorry.
10	MR. BABINGTON: That's okay.
11	MR. TUCKER: If we could enter
12	those as Exhibits 1 and 2.
13	(Exhibit Nos. 1 & 2 marked for
14	identification.)
15	MR. TUCKER: If you choose, you
16	can contact
17	THE WITNESS: I only received
18	this one. I did not receive the second
19	one.
20	MR. TUCKER: That's where
21	somebody signed for it at your
22	THE WITNESS: I didn't know. No
23	one signed for it at my house. They hand-
24	delivered it.

MR. MCCUSKEY: I think that just proves he served it.

MR. BABINGTON: Yeah. I believe this is the affidavit of the server.

MR. MCCUSKEY: They're not claiming you saw that.

MR. BABINGTON: The subpoena will be Aurednik Exhibit 1; the affidavit of service from the server will be Aurednik

MR. TUCKER: Give you the name of the court reporter's Johnny Jackson & Associates. And if you choose, you can contact them on Tuesday of next week to schedule an appointment where you can go into their office and review the transcript and make any corrections, maybe something you, if you want to read over something maybe you said and you think it's something different than what they put down, you can make corrections on the sheet. But you cannot receive a copy of the transcript, but you can go in and review it.

So I'll give you one of their 1 business cards if you need to contact them, then one of mine. 3 I'd just like to mention to you that there are laws that protect you as 5 far as being discriminated against for 6 appearing here today, and if at any time you feel you have been discriminated 8 against for your appearance here, then you can contact me. Here's some information 10 to the board of appeals, you need to 11 contact them also. And you have 30 days 12 from the time that you would feel like 13 you've been discriminated against to file 14 a claim. I'll give you a copy of their 15 information. 16 MR. BABINGTON: Should we have 17 everyone introduce themselves? 18 MR. TUCKER: That would be good. 19 MR. BABINGTON: Bill, I quess you 20 already introduced yourself. 21 2.2 MR. TUCKER: Bill Tucker with Office of Miners' Health Safety and 23 Training. 24

MR. O'BRIEN: John O'Brien with
the West Virginia Office of Miners' Health
Safety and Training.
MR. SHERER: Eric Sherer with
MSHA.
MR. BABINGTON: Matt Babington.
I'm an attorney with the Department of
Labor.
MR. MCATEER: Jim, I'm Davitt
McAteer, and I'm with the Governor's
Special Investigative Team.
Two others in the room, could
they identify themselves as well?
MR. WATKINS: Yeah, I'm Tim
Watkins with MSHA.
MR. MCCUSKEY: J.B. McCuskey with
Shuman McCuskey & Slicer.
MR. BABINGTON: Before we get
started, I have a letter from Norman Page,
who's our chief accident investigator,
describes just some of the background of
this interview and includes contact
information for contacting him at a later
time if you have any additional

information you'd like to provide. 1 MR. MCCUSKEY: Go ahead and take 2 a minute and read that, because I thought 3 maybe you'd gotten one, but I don't think you'd seen that. 5 THE WITNESS: No, I haven't seen 6 that. MR. BABINGTON: Do you want to go 8 off the record while he reads that? MR. MCCUSKEY: Yeah. 10 (Break.) 11 MR. BABINGTON: Before we go back 12 on, just a couple of little things to keep 13 in mind since we have a court reporter. 14 First is try to remember to say 15 yes or no when you're asked those 16 questions rather than nodding or shaking 17 your head. You know, it helps for the 18 transcript and the court reporter if you 19 affirmatively say yes or no. And we'll 20 jump in and remind you of that if you end 21 22 up getting into a habit. The second thing, if we end up 23 using the map, if you could be as 24

1	descriptive as possible about the names of
2	the different areas or entry, crosscut,
3	things like that, the map is pretty well
4	labeled. If you don't know, you can say
5	it's an approximation or an estimate. And
6	again, we can help out.
7	We also may have you highlight
8	areas like travelways and things like that
9	if that comes up.
10	The last thing is as much as
11	possible, wait for the interviewer to
12	complete asking his or her question before
13	you start answering, again, so we don't
14	have people talking over each other.
15	It's, again, easier for the court
16	reporter.
17	Any other questions?
18	THE WITNESS: No.
19	MR. BABINGTON: Let's go back
20	on.
21	EXAMINATION
22	BY MR. O'BRIEN:
23	Q. First of all, we appreciate you coming in
24	today helping us out on this investigation.

JIM AUREDNIK -- EXAM BY MR. O'BRIEN First of all, how many years of mining 1 experience do you have, roughly? 2 Fourteen, 15 years, somewhere in there. 3 Α. And could you give us a brief history of Q. your mining experience, where you've worked and 5 what you've done, things like that? 6 Yeah. Massey Energy is pretty much the only company I've worked for. I started at Elk Run 8 processing plant in the lab, lab technician. worked there for four or five months and moved into 10 11 the electrician training program.

And after a year, was certified there in being just a -- actually, after I was certified, I went to the move crew, worked on the belt move crew on the midnight for about a year. Then got a job in the electrical field, and just from there worked my way up to a chief electrician over the years. I done everything, section boss to mine foreman.

MR. BABINGTON: I'm sorry.

Mr. Aurednik, could you speak a little bit louder, please? Thank you.

- Q. And what is your current job?
- A. Full-time mine rescue.

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Q. And what does that entail? What does that

involve? What duties do you perform as full-time mine rescue, strictly all mine rescue or?

- A. No. Yes and no. I mean, we are sort of like safety compliant officers for the company right now. I'm a crew leader. I have six guys under me. We take care of all the mines up north right now and plus make all of our team visits at all of our mines that we cover, that's required by law.
- Q. Do you have a station, place that you're stationed out of?
- A. We are stationed out of Mt. Hope, right in front of MSHA's main office there right beside the post office in Mt. Hope.
 - Q. And who is your employer?
 - A. Massey Coal Services.
 - Q. Massey Coal Services.

Let me back up just a second. What mining certifications do you possess or do you have?

- A. Certified electrician, certified shop fireman, certified foreman, MSHA instructor, MSHA electrical instructor, EMT, that's about all I can think of right offhand.
- **Q. Okay.**

A. Surface miner.

- Q. And on April the 5th of this year, what was your job title or what did you do then?
 - A. I was crew leader full-time mine rescue.
 - Q. Same as you are now?
 - A. Same as I am now, yes.
- Q. All right. You say you're a, have your safety compliance officer or, you and your team, aside from full-time mine rescue?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. In addition to?
- A. In addition to. That way we've kind of went that route so that we can stay familiar with all of our mines that we cover, which is required by law, and we pretty much know what we have. You know, if you go in and walk your airways and walk your beltlines and your track, at least this way you have people from the team in all aspects that is someone when you go is familiar totally 100 percent with this coal mines.
- Q. Now do you visit all Massey mines or do you have a set number of mines that you and your team visit?
 - A. I visit 31 at the present time.

- Q. Are they all, what states are they located?
 - A. All in West Virginia.
 - Q. Is that all of Massey's mines?
 - A. No, it is not.

- Q. Is it primarily -- where are they located, northern, southern, all throughout the state?
- A. Route 3 and northern and the one in Pineville.
- Q. And when you say when you visit these mines, what exactly do you do, you and your team do?
- A. There's a difference between the visiting and what I take care of. When we make a team visit, we do as required by law. But the teams that, the mines that I am not primarily responsible for, we go in and make a team visit, most of the time we'll ride a mantrip to the section, make the faces, we see anything wrong, we'll have it straightened up then, and most of the time I'll have my team, we will walk the belts back out.
 - Q. Okay. Now from --
- A. Sometimes if it's just a team visit, depending on how much time we have and how many we

have to make, sometimes just ride to the face and 1 ride back up. It just all depends on --2 Bear with me for my clarification. When 3 **Q**. you say "team visits," is that a compliance team or as the mine rescue team? 5 That is as a mine rescue team. 6 Α. That is to comply with the regulations? Q. Law, comply with the regulations. 8 Α. Now do you make other visits as a Q. compliance team? 10 A. Yes. 11 Separately? 12 Q. 13 Α. Yes. What mines do you visit there? 14 Q. At the time, now or? A. 15 Let's go back then on April 5th. 16 Q. At the time I was responsible for Mammoth, 17 Α. Green Valley, and Nicholas Energy. 18 And how about now? 19 Q. Now I am responsible for Green Valley, 20 Α. Nicholas Energy, and the one mines at Kepler. 21 22 **Q**. And on the compliance team, what things do you and your team look for? What kind of functions

do you do when you go to the mines?

23

A. We walk all the airways, walk all the beltlines, have an electrical guy that takes care of the electrical side, I have a guy that spends three days on a section, I have a guy that stays outside and audits all the files. And I'm pretty much a captain, wherever they need help, I try to fill in.

We take pictures, compile our audit, come back and — you spend a day, day and a half typing it up and preparing it, then we present it to the superintendent, and from there it goes from super, with the superintendent president, and if it needs to, we take it all the way to West Branch. It just all depends.

- Q. So basically, what in your report, what do you put in your report?
- A. Time out. I have not done one of these new audits, because I have been here.
 - Q. Okay.
 - A. Since April 5th.
 - Q. Okay.

A. Now the other guys have already started doing them. The guys from my team are doing them, but I have been here, so I can't answer a whole lot

of those questions.

- Q. April 5th and before, did you make these types of visits?
 - A. Just -- yes.
 - Q. Did you compile reports?
 - A. Yes, we compiled audits then.
- Q. What kind of things did you put in the audits? What kind of information was in the audit report?
- A. Just deficiencies that we found, that we discovered, and then the audits that we done then were pretty detailed, but not as detailed as what we are doing now as far as the airways and neutrals and things.
- Q. What sort of -- you say "deficiencies."
 What sort of deficiencies are you speaking about?

 Just kind of give us some examples.
- A. Same thing your inspector is looking for as far as roof control, combustible materials, equipment violations, things of that nature.
- Q. And as an audit, or compliance officer or audit team member, you did that April 5th and before?
- **A. Yes.**

- Q. You have not done that since?
 - A. I have not personally, no. I have went and checked a couple of the audits that have well, one audit that they have already done, I went back on to check, but I have not done an audit since.
 - Q. Now this report you say that you compile or the team compiled before and I assume now they're compiling reports and it goes up the ladder to some point, the command chains to some point.

 What happens after that? Do you get feedback from these people or?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. What kind of feedback do you get exactly?
- A. Some of them are really glad that we come do the audits, and some of them hate to see us coming just like they hate to see you all coming.
- Q. I can appreciate that. And I can appreciate the job that you guys did, because before I came with this agency, I did what you did for another coal company, so I can feel your pain, so to speak. Okay? Okay. And I appreciate it.

The deficiencies, is there any follow up on the deficiencies, seeing they were corrected?

1	A. Yes.
2	Q. And how does that look or how does that
3	work?
4	A. We'll follow up on the audit after they
5	have signed off on it and everything is complete
6	and we will go back and see that it all has been
7	done.
8	Q. So the team goes back
9	A. Yes.
10	Q to check up on the deficiencies that
11	they had seen previously?
12	A. Yes.
13	Q. Then the mine personnel doesn't say, okay,
14	we've corrected it?
15	A. Yes.
16	Q. And tells you that it's corrected? Which
17	way is it? I'm sorry.
18	A. Both.
19	Q. Both. Okay. Okay. Thank you.
20	All right. Let's go from April 5th on.
21	Now what have you been doing since then?
22	A. UBB. And the days that we are away from
23	UBB, I have been trying to get all my team visits
24	done that are required by the regulations.

- Q. What are you doing at UBB?
 - A. Whatever Mr. Tucker tells me to.

No, it just depends on what's going on that day. You cannot ever -- I mean, you'll plan something one day and it changes before the next morning, so it just depends.

Q. I understand.

Did you have a chance to visit UBB prior to April 5th?

A. Yes.

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- Q. In what capacity did you visit?
- 12 A. Team visit.
 - Q. And how many times did you visit prior to April 5th, visit UBB prior to April 5th, how many times? Roughly, approximately.
- A. Seven to eight.
 - Q. Now you say "team visit," that is a mine rescue team visit?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Not as a safety compliance --
- 21 **A. No.**
- 22 Q. -- visit? Okay.
- A. I was not responsible for that coal mines.
- Q. I'm trying to get clear in my head.

Okay.

When you were there at UBB, did you see anything that stood out as far as deficiencies or any problems or even any good things that you may want to relate to this group?

- A. No. Just the, it's just an ordinary everyday coal mines. I mean, the track entry was always dusted well and --
- Q. How would you characterize the ventilation from what you saw?
- A. The last time that I was across the longwall face, I had to wear a coat. It was a lot of air coming across the face.
 - O. And about when was that visit?
- A. Probably a month to a month and a half prior to the explosion.
- Q. Let's go back to April 5th. When did you find out about the event, the explosion, and how did you find out about it?
- A. I received a phone call, I was at home on vacation. I didn't even know there was an explosion at the time I received the call. I was just told to report to the station as quickly as possible.

A. Robert Asbury.
Q. And who is Robert Asbury?
A. Robert is my captain.
Q. Then what did you do?
A. Drove from home to the station and from
station to the Ellis Portal.
Q. And you're a member of which team? I'm
y. Are you a member of a particular team,
ey team?
A. Southern West Virginia Mine Rescue Team.
Q. So you reported to Ellis Portal, you and
entire team?
A. Yes, the entire team was at Ellis Portal
I arrived. As far as I know. I can't answer
I mean.
Q. I understand.
About what time was that?
A. It was probably between 3:30 and 4:00.
Q. If you would, just please take your time
describe to us what transpired once you got to
s Portal throughout the next day or two of your
-
rescue.

and I's apparatuses were already RZ'd and ready to go.

We placed them on a mantrip and proceeded to go underground.

I guess we made it four to six crosscuts underground and I seen lights. I was driving the mantrip. And I seen lights coming down the track, so I immediately backed out, because I knew that that that mantrip coming out, something was going on.

At that time, you know, we knew they had an explosion at that time.

But when they got outside, the seven deceased, first deceased were on that mantrip, as well as the two survivors.

And we removed those guys from the mantrips and began CPR. There was not even an ambulance on the property at the time. We pretty much done CPR until one of the guys from Whitesville Ambulance Service come around and pronounced them dead.

After that was kind of all settled down, I guess 25, 30 minutes later myself and Robert Asbury and Mark Bolen put our stuff back on the mantrip

and proceeded back underground to Ellis switch.

From Ellis switch inby, for about 40 breaks I guess Rob and I walked in front of the mantrip checking the atmosphere, checking phone lines. I removed the phone from the Ellis switch and took with us so we would have something to communicate on.

And everything was good all the way up to about 60 break. Somewhere in that area we started noticing the darkness, you could really tell the difference. It was really well rock dusted outby. I mean, it was really white. And then you could tell when you start getting in this dark, black area where the soot and stuff.

But until you get to 78 break, we really didn't notice any destruction, a whole lot of anything at all. And from that point in is where we pretty much had to start working on the phone lines a lot. Slowed down a lot.

From 78 break -- this is where I lose a lot in here, because I mean, we're ...

- Q. I understand.
- A. From 78 break inby, I traveled the beltline, probably made it up five to six to seven

crosscuts where the fresh water line was broke in two. It was running wide open. We retreated from there and went back to 42 break on Ellis track and found the shutoff valve and shut the main water off to keep everything from flooding out.

At that time when we got back up to 78 break, we seen lights coming down the track, which was Jason Whitehead and Chris Blanchard. We ran into those two there and they pretty much stayed there as we proceeded on inby repairing phone lines and exploring up to the mother drive belt where we found our first victim.

All this took quite some time, because you're trying to maintain communications and by mine rescue procedures and --

But from there, we ran our phone line up the headgate side where we found the next four victims along the headgate track and proceeded from there to the face of the longwall where we set up our last fresh air base and that's as far as I went. I only made it to like shield 80 on the face and that was it.

Like I said, it all took quite some time. Then they pulled us out.

That was Tuesday morning sometime, as far 1 as I can remember, or Monday night late or 2 something. 3 Tuesday was pretty much a down day. Now I'm going to ask you a few clarifying 5 Q. questions. When you first went in what's the 6 7 mantrip --Before I go any further, if at any time 8 you need to take a break, just let us know, feel 9 free to let us know and we'll take a break. Okay? 10 Let you know that up front. 11 Let's go back. You went outside, the 12 first bus came out, then you went back in. And who 13 went back in with you? 14 Robert Asbury and Mark Bolen. Α. 15 And about what time was that, would you 16 Q. 17 guess? I wouldn't even try to quess. Α. 18 And those two gentlemen are on your team? 19 Q. A. Yes. 20 Team members. Q. 21 22 A. Yes. Massey. 23 Q. Yes. 24 Α.

- Q. And when you proceeded in, it was just you three everything that you had explained to us, was it just you three guys at that time?

 A. Yes, pretty much. I mean, we had explored
- about half of this and come back and had some guys bring some phone line in, because we didn't have enough phone line, and some more of our guys off our team brought some phone line up to us and we pretty much proceeded up with those guys. And I can remember one of them as being Shane McPherson, but I really couldn't tell you who all was there and who all wasn't.

Like I said, these first five days really run together a lot, because, I mean, you're working on 10 hour sleep in five days, and time runs together, you don't know if it's daylight or if it's dark or what the date is or anything else.

- Q. Were you under apparatus during this period at any time?
 - A. No. Not the first night, no.
- Q. What was the highest CO rating that you recall?
- A. The first night the highest I recall was in this crossover belt was at 280 some or something

1 | like that.

- Q. Did you pick up any other gases, such as methane?
- A. We had picked up some methane, but nothing in the explosive range. We were staying at like one and a half, 1.8. You know, it just depended on the area in the dead end, the dead zones, what you would call wasn't a whole lot of air ventilation moving or whatever. A lot of stoppings being out.
 - Q. What was your oxygen content?
- A. Never had any low O_2 that I can remember. Not until we made that push up here on the very last night to find the last of the victims. That was after, you know, everything had already been, after we done pumped nitrogen in and everything else.
- Q. Did you encounter, going back to the first night into the next day, next morning, did you encounter any fires?
 - A. No.
 - Q. Did you see any smoke?
 - A. No.
- Q. At what point did you see any other teams arrive other than Massey teams underground, or did

you ever see any other teams?

- A. I never seen another team arrive. I was always on the lead up front.
- Q. And when you got a notification to come out, you said on Tuesday morning sometime?
 - A. As far as I can -- as far as I know.
 - Q. Who gave that command to come back?
 - A. Command center.
 - Q. Command center.

Did you encounter anyone on the way out, any other teams or team members?

A. Yes. Team members. But as far as, like I say — I can remember one ICG team being there, but I can't remember what day that was. I remember one of his guys, they had a diabetic outbreak I guess or whatever you call it and they had to remove that team.

But as far as I know, this is the first five days that that was the only other team that was underground besides Massey Energy's team, and we also took Terrell Blankenship and several three to four guys from their team. But the first five days, we were the only team underground.

Q. Going back to that first day, April 5th

into April 6th, did you guys have to do any 1 ventilation changes --Α. No. 3 -- checks or --Q. Α. No. 5 -- move the air in any way? 6 Q. 7 MR. MCCUSKEY: Let him finish. A. No. 8 Let's go back. You said you ran into Q. Chris Blanchard and -- was it Jason Whitehead? 10 Α. Yes. 11 Where had they been, do you know? 12 Q. At the time, as far as I know, the only 13 Α. place they had been was to the longwall face on the 14 head side and the longwall too. They did not go 15 across the face. 16 What did they relay to you when you met? 17 Q. Just they had a lot of CO when they went Α. 18 up the tail side and that they had seen a couple 19 victims on the longwall track and that was about 20 all they really knew. 21 22 Q. And where did they go after that, do you know? 23 No. 24 Α.

1	Q. And where was this? Where did you meet
2	these guys?
3	A. 78 break.
4	Q. 78 break, okay.
5	One more clarifying question. Just take
6	you back. You said around 3:30 or 4:00. Was that
7	when you got the call or when you arrived at Ellis?
8	A. When I arrived at our Performance station
9	would be at Ellis.
10	Q. About what time did you get the call, do
11	you think?
12	A. I was thinking it was right around 3:00,
13	3:15, somewhere in between that time frame.
14	Q. And you were at home in Beckley?
15	A. Yes.
16	Q. You live in Beckley. Okay. Thank you.
17	When did you call out about finding the
18	victims?
19	A. As we located them.
20	Q. And who did you speak to?
21	A. At that time I think Chris Adkins was in
22	the command center on the phone.
23	Q. Chris Adkins?
24	A. Yes.

1	Q. Okay. I'm sorry.
2	And did you say you went down the longwall
3	face the first night?
4	A. I went to like Shield 80.
5	Q. Did you see any bodies, any victims?
6	A. Two.
7	Q. And where were they located?
8	A. I cannot I don't know.
9	Q. That's all I have for right now.
10	A. I know one was at the stage loader and
11	that's the only one I knew for sure, at the stage
12	loader.
13	MR. O'BRIEN: Okay. I appreciate
14	it. That's all I have for right now.
15	Eric?
16	EXAMINATION
17	BY MR. SHERER:
18	Q. Again, thank you for coming down here,
19	Mr. Aurednik. I'm going to jump around a bit, so
20	just bear with me.
21	You mentioned that you, your team does
22	compliance audits and that you had not done that
23	for Upper Big Branch. Who would have done that for
24	Upper Big Branch, do you know?

1	A. It would have been the other team. We
2	have two teams. It would have been number one
3	team. I was classified as number two team.
4	Q. Number one team. And that's Southern West
5	Virginia. Who's the head of that organization or
6	group?
7	A. I'm trying to think to that time. I think
8	at that time I suppose it would have been Rob
9	Asbury. As far as I know, I'm not a hundred
10	percent sure on that who was the crew leader at
11	that time on that group.
12	Q. Okay. Sure. I appreciate that.
12 13	Q. Okay. Sure. I appreciate that. Now you mentioned that you got to the

- A. No. Like I said, I was on vacation that day. On vacation for the week. I met Rob Asbury at our Performance station.
 - Q. Okay.

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- A. He was the only one there at the time.
- Q. You mentioned that you started underground, you back, back out when the mantrip with the first victims came out, and then you later went back into the mine. Did Mr. Asbury tell you to go back into the mine?
- A. No.
 - Q. Who told you to do that?
 - A. No one.
- Q. No one. You just did that of your own violation (sic)?
- 17 A. On what?
 - Q. Of your own freewill, I guess.
 - A. Yes. That's what I do for a living.
 - Q. And we appreciate that, sir.
 - You said you'd gotten up to roughly 78 break and that's when things really started to be in a deteriorated condition.
- Did you set up something like a fresh air

base there?

- A. Yes.
- Q. Who was in charge of that fresh air base?

 Did you leave anybody there to maintain

 communication or anything?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Who was that, please?
- A. I left Mark Bolen there as I repaired phone line up to the next fresh air base.
 - Q. Okay. Thank you.

So Mr. Bolen stayed there. And how many people went on inby at that point, at that point in time?

- A. It's really a long point of time between here and here a lot happened. I mean, we had other people, like I say, came in behind us and we moved people up and, like I said, I went up the beltline, I know, all the way to the mother drive. Who was in the track and who was in the other entries, I really could not answer.
- Q. We appreciate the conditions that you're working under, sir.

When is the first time you saw anybody from MSHA or the State in the mine?

1	A. When I pulled on Ellis bench.
2	Q. Okay.
3	A. Johnny Kinder from the State was there.
4	Q. So John was already there. Was the State
5	team already there?
6	A. No.
7	Q. Okay. Just John.
8	Did anybody from the State or MSHA go in
9	with you guys?
10	A. No.
11	Q. When do you recall, roughly, noticing
12	anybody from the State or MSHA in the mine?
13	A. I really could not answer that.
14	Q. Do you recall anybody from the State or
15	MSHA at any time that first night?
16	A. Yes. Eugene worked for the State. I do
17	recall him being with us.
18	Q. Okay. Thank you. Anybody from MSHA?
19	A. No, yes. Mike Hicks, Jerry Cook.
20	Q. Okay. Thank you.
21	When you're inby 78 switch, did you notice
22	any tracks in the rock dust or soot?
23	A. Yes.
24	Q. Did you believe that there might have been

1	survivors when you saw those?
2	A. No.
3	Q. And why did you not believe there may have
4	been survivors?
5	A. Because there were tracks going in and I
6	pretty much knew that Jason and Chris were there
7	and all the tracks going in belonged to them,
8	because
9	Q. Thank you.
10	Did you take a map in with you?
11	A. First night, no. We had a map the first
12	night, I do remember that, but I did not take one
13	with me, no.
14	Q. When you were pulled back out of the mine,
15	I think you mentioned sometime Monday morning, did
16	you guys have a debriefing when you got out of the
17	mines?
18	A. Yes.
19	Q. Who conducted that, please?
20	A. Command center, MSHA, State and the
21	company.
22	Q. I told you I'm going to jump around a
23	bit. Let's go back to the safety audits.
24	If I understand that there is two, two

safety auditing teams that Massey has? 1 Α. Yes. 2 And Massey has more than two mine rescue 3 **Q**. teams, so do all mine rescue teams do safety 4 audits? 5 Yes, as far as I know. 6 Α. 7 Q. Okay. I don't know about the Cumberland teams, I 8 Α. couldn't answer for. When you guys are doing safety audits, do 10 Q. you tell the mine that you're going to be up there 11 next week or whenever you're going to come? 12 Sometimes. It just depends on what the 13 Α. situation is and what occurs. 14 Do you think that the, once you got Q. 15 on-site, do you think that the people underground 16 know that you're on-site? Do you think that 17 information is relayed in the mine? 18 19 Α. Yes. Okay. Thank you. 20 Q. Is there someone in charge of the audit 21 22 process? 23 Α. Yes. Q. Who's that? 24

1	A. The crew leaders, myself, Robert Asbury,
2	Jeremy McClung.
3	Q. And do you report to someone?
4	A. Yes.
5	Q. As far as the audit function. Who is
6	that?
7	A. Like I said, I have not done any of these
8	since this began, so I really cannot answer that
9	question.
LO	Q. As far as April the 5th and immediately
L1	prior to that?
L2	A. Yes. Robert Asbury.
L3	Q. And who did Mr. Asbury report to, do you
L 4	know?
L5	A. They go on into corporate, Elizabeth
L6	Chamberlin, I suppose, and whoever.
L7	Q. Have you ever met with Ms. Chamberlin and
L8	discussed the safety audits with her?
L9	A. No.
20	Q. That first night when you guys were in
21	there, what did you think happened that caused this
22	explosion?
23	A. To be honest, it never crossed my mind.
24	Q. Did you have any discussions with anybody

1	about that subject?
2	A. No. The first night we were pretty much
3	just trying to locate people.
4	Q. Are you aware of any discussions that this
5	mine may have had pop offs on the longwall face or
6	inundations near the tail?
7	A. No.
8	Q. Were you aware that this mine had had
9	methane inundations in previous years?
10	A. Yes.
11	Q. How are you aware of that?
12	A. One of the fellows that is on our team
13	worked this particular longwall at this mines.
14	Q. And who was that, please?
15	A. Mark Bolen.
16	Q. Okay. Thank you.
17	Have you ever heard that methane would
18	come out and sound like a jet engine?
19	A. Yes.
20	Q. Or train or something.
21	Did anyone besides Mr. Bolen mention that?
22	A. No.
23	Q. Had you heard that this mine had possibly
24	been having problems with methane a day or so prior

to this explosion? 1 Α. No. 2 Have you heard that they possibly had been 3 Q. told they either mine coal or come out of the mine, 4 one of the two? 5 No. I have never heard anyone in 6 management say that. 7 Q. Okay. Thank you. 8 Have you heard rumors of anything like 10 that? Α. No. 11 Okay. Thank you. 12 Q. Are you aware that an audit team was 13 supposed to have gone to UBB on April the 5th? 14 Α. What are you calling an audit team? 15 A safety audit team, I guess, Mr. Asbury's 16 Q. team? 17 I am aware that a couple of our guys were Α. 18 going there, but not to conduct an audit. 19 What were they going there for? 20 Q. Α. They were just going there to help out and 21 if anything they needed help with, but one of those 22 guy's wives was pregnant and they decided not to go 23 24 there because it's hard to get a ride in and out,

so they went to a smaller mines. 1 Do you know what they were having problems Q. 2 with? 3 No, I do not. I mean, it's just general violations, nothing, just --5 So it's more compliance? 6 **Q**. 7 More compliance type issues and you had nothing -- we don't involve ourselves in anything 8 major unless as far as fixing goes, I mean, you know, it's -- but we will go up and try to take 10 care of -- we have a lot of electricians take care 11 of small electrical issues and labeling, you know, 12 stuff like that. 13 And who were those two individuals? 14 0. I know that -- I don't know who all was Α. 15 involved in that, because I was not there. I was 16 in the Mt. Hope station. And I was on vacation 17 that day, so I really --18 But that's all hearsay, what I told you 19 there. I don't know that to be fact, I just --20 Q. Okay. Sure. And that's fine. 21 22 But you mentioned one of the gentlemen's

A. I think it was at the time.

wives was pregnant. Who was that, please?

23

Q. Okay. Thank you.
Have you heard of any problems with
methane on this longwall prior to the explosion?
A. No.
Q. Are you aware of any ventilation problems?
A. No.
Q. What did you think of the condition of the
rock dust the last time you were in this mine?
A. I thought it was good.
Q. Did you get off in the intake or return
entries?
A. No.
MR. SHERER: That's all the
questions I have got for right now.
A. What do you mean by the last time I was in
this coal mines?
Q. Prior to the explosion, sir.
I need all the help I can get.
EXAMINATION
BY MR. MCATEER:
Q. Mr. Aurednik, when was the last time
before the, before April 5th that you were in this
mine?
A. I'd say it was probably a month to a month

and a half prior to the explosion. 1 MR. MCCUSKEY: I think he did 2 answer that, but he gave the same answer 3 the first time. 4 MR. MCATEER: Yes, I was trying 5 to find that. 6 7 And at that time you said, you mentioned Q. looking at the rock dust. And the track entries 8 were dusted well; correct? 9 10 Α. Yes. Did you go into any of the other entries? 0. 11 No, I was up -- yes, going up to the face 12 Α. to the longwall, I did travel a couple of other 13 entries and it was dusted well in those entries 14 also. 15 Going back to Eric's question. Do you 16 know where the group had gone since they didn't go 17 to Upper Big Branch, they went to some other 18 alternative place. Do you know? 19 Α. No, I do not. 20 But this was not -- to your knowledge, 21 **Q**. 22 this was not a compliance audit, per say? Α. No. 23 Because we heard it was, but just second 24 Q.

1	and thirdhand.
2	A. No, I know that it was not for a matter of
3	fact, because the compliance audit had already been
4	done for the quarter, as far as I know.
5	Q. You'd been on a compliance audit?
6	A. No.
7	Q. No?
8	A. It's not my mines, so I'm not responsible
9	for it.
LO	Q. Okay. Okay. But it's Rob's,
L1	Mr. Asbury's?
L2	A. It was their team.
L3	Q. Okay.
L 4	A. Team one's.
L5	Q. Is team one better than team two?
L6	A. No, absolutely not.
L7	Q. I knew the answer to that.
L 8	A. It depends on who you ask, I guess.
L9	MR. MCCUSKEY: You knew the
20	answer he'd give.
21	MR. MCATEER: I did know that.
22	All right.
23	Q. Any communications that you heard from the
24	command center or were engaged in from the command

center on the day of the third, that is 24 hours after the explosion, can you tell me who you talked to or?

- A. Actually, I cannot remember who I talked to for the first hour to two hours underground, but I can remember when Chris Adkins came onto the phone, it was a big relief in our minds and hearts to have somebody that we could talk to that kind of knew procedures and what was going on.
 - Q. Okay. Okay.

- A. I can remember when he came in and took over. And that's the only person I can really remember talking to the first night was Mr. Adkins.
- Q. I'm going to speak for myself and I think the rest of the team, thank you for being on the mine rescue team and making an effort, and the other people that were there, thank you for trying to save these folks.

When you first arrived and you met with Mr. Asbury, what did he know at that time?

A. I drove straight to the station. I had my personal truck that day and I drove straight to the station. I met him there, because he and I usually do everything like this together. I mean, we've

got each others backs, you know. And all he knew at that time is that there had been an explosion, and that's all he told me. And when he called me, he didn't have any idea what had happened. He just knew something had happened. And when I got there he did know there was an explosion, but he had no details or anything else.

Like I said, all the other guys that was on the team that was there the day, they were already at the Ellis Portal with the trailers and the equipment, but Rob was waiting for me at the station, because that's where he told me to report to.

Q. Sure. Okay.

And you didn't have any cell phone contact, so you can't change it.

- A. Right, no cell phone contact.
- Q. Do you recall who was with the victims, the first group of victims that you saw when they were bringing them out when you saw them at the six or eight break and you backed out?
- A. The only thing I can remember about that entire ordeal is that my neighbor was on that mantrip, I remember seeing him, and that Wayne

1	Persinger was driving the mantrip and the rest of
2	the guys I really did not recognize or know. I
3	knew some of them, but I didn't recognize them at
4	the time.
5	Q. Sure.
6	Who's your neighbor?
7	A. Robert Clark.
8	Q. And you said that when you got him out,
9	the ambulance team hadn't, ambulance, Whitesville
LO	ambulance hadn't gotten there yet?
L1	A. No. I can't remember an ambulance being
L2	on-site at all.
L3	Q. And was it the Whitesville ambulance that
L 4	was the first one to get there?
L5	A. I think they were the first ones to
L6	arrive, yes.
L7	Q. Do you remember where you saw Eugene White
L8	when you got
L9	A. I think 78 break was the first time I seen
20	Eugene White.
21	Q. And how about Hicks and Cook?
22	A. 78 break.
23	Q. All right. When you ran into Blanchard
24	and Whitehead underground, did they have anything

on, SCSRs?

- A. SCSRs.
- Q. They were using them or just wearing them?
- A. At the time they were not using them, they just still had them on. There was no reason at that time to be wearing them.
 - Q. Sure.

And did they give you, can you tell us what kind of information they gave you at the time you first ran into them?

- A. Really about the biggest thing I can remember them saying is that they had seen two victims on the track going to the longwall face and that they had been to the tail of the longwall across the crosscut and up and there was a lot of CO over in there on the tail side. And that's really about all I can remember them ...
- Q. Would they have taken some readings? Did they give you numbers?
- A. No, because their Solarises were pegged out.
- Q. What did you do with Mr. Blanchard and Mr. Whitehead at the time?
- A. Left them at 78 break. From there I

believe they were escorted to the outside as far as

I know.

- Q. Did you go back to 78 break at any time after that?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. What time was that?
- A. It was all through the night multiple trips to retrieve phone line in phones and different material, because that was as far as you could go on a mantrip.
- Q. Blanchard and Whitehead, to your recollection, weren't there?
- A. No, I do not remember them being there after going back.
- Q. But when you and Mr. Asbury and Mark Bolen and yourself went up, where did the three of you go? I wasn't sure I followed that correctly.
- A. I traveled the belt entry. And as far as I can remember, Mark and Rob traveled track entry. And we made it up to the shelter location.

By radio, I think Sam McPherson already came in. He was here at the fresh air base and we were communicating by him and we got phone line and moved up to where the shelter location used to be.

the mother drive where we found the first victim.

And from there some of our other teammates had already arrived. Actually, I didn't see a lot of these guys because we were up in front doing our own thing and I do know that after we established a fresh air base here at the longwall switch that one team went inby towards the headgate 22 section and my team and I went towards the longwall.

- Q. And what did your team find?
- A. We found these four victims outby in the track entry, found the victims at the stage loader.

MR. MCCUSKEY: Tell him about what break you were on, if you can.

Otherwise, they'll make you mark it on the map.

A. It was right around 18, 19 break, somewhere in there when we found the first victims, I believe, 20 break, somewhere in there.

And we set up a fresh air base, multiple fresh air bases up through here, maintained communication. It was all a slow process because you had to run new phone line through the entire way. Like I said, I can remember the last fresh

air base we set up was right at the face, one break inby the face on the longwall.

Shane McPherson was with us. He was an old longwall guy. He's the one that went all the way across the face and found the victims. Like I said, I only went to about shield 80 with him to maintain radio communication. I think right after that time, as far as I can remember, when we got back to this fresh air base, we were told to retreat to the outside.

- Q. When you and Shane went across, you stopped at 80, you said?
- A. Yeah, somewhere around 60 to 80 shield. Somewhere in that area. I cannot be a hundred percent sure.
- Q. Did you see any footprints or anything, anything --
- **A. No.**

- Q. Did he find the victims at the time on the wall?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Did he come back out with you and pick you up at 80?
- A. Yes. Actually, I think I retreated before

he -- I was retreating as he was retreating. 1 Q. Okay. 2 And I don't think that he went all the way 3 to the tail that night, the first night. I think he only made it to like shield one something and he 5 started encountering high levels of CO and he 6 retreated off. Q. So you guys were then advised to retreat, 8 come outside? 10 Α. Yes. When you came outside, did you debrief Q. 11 anybody? Did you debrief anybody when you came 12 outside? 13 Did I debrief anybody? 14 Α. Q. Or brief anybody. 15 Just the command center. 16 A. Who was in the group? Do you remember? 17 Q. Adkins? 18 I remember Chris Adkins being there, 19 Virgil Brown being there, Elizabeth being there. 20 That's really about all I can remember besides the 21 guys off our team I knew that was there. 22

Q. Anybody from the State?

A. Eugene was with us.

23

1	Q. And I recognize how difficult this
2	recollection business is. I understand that. So
3	as best you can.
4	Did you give them any readings at the
5	time? Did you give them any sort of general, what
6	did you tell them on the debriefing?
7	A. I remember they asked us could we tell
8	what happened and all I could remember was all of
9	us getting together and just telling them, no, that
10	everything was just moved in every direction and
11	that we had encountered CO across the face and
12	longwall. And I can't really remember any numbers.
13	Q. Sure.
14	A. I really can't remember why they pulled us
15	out that first night to be one hundred percent
16	honest with you. I think it was something happened
17	up in this area, if I'm not mistaken.
18	MR. BABINGTON: When you say
19	"this area," you're referring to headgate
20	22?
21	THE WITNESS: Yes. Like I say, I
22	did not go that way. That's a different
23	team that went in that direction. I mean,

it was our team, but different guys.

1	Q. From a standpoint of mine rescue, what are
2	your suggestions on how to do it differently the
3	next time or do it the same?
4	A. I thought everything went pretty well on
5	this time. We went and held up and we done what we
6	had to do. We looked into buying some more
7	equipment as far as radio boosters and things like
8	that, because I think that would help next time.
9	Q. Did you have the backup teams with you or
10	there nearby?
11	A. Yeah. We never proceeded (phonetic) any
12	about that backup route.
13	Q. Well, there are times when there's a
14	tension about that, and I understand that, yeah.
15	But in your case, do you think you had enough
16	backup?
17	A. Yes.
18	Q. You'd been in the mines for 15 years.
19	What do you think happened?
20	A. I'm going to leave that to the facts, I
21	guess, because like I said, everything is just
22	Q. Sure.
23	A everywhere.
24	MR. MCATEER: That's all the

questions I have at this time. 1 **EXAMINATION** 2 BY MR. BABINGTON: 3 I have two quick ones and let's take a 0. short break. 5 Who are the individuals on the number one 6 7 crew as of April 5th? I think you mentioned Rob Asbury was on that crew. 8 Rob was kind of the leader of that crew, but I don't know that he is on that crew as far as 10 the audits go. He was the kind of overseer of all 11 the matters at that time also. As far as people on 12 that crew. 13 I see you don't recall any of the other 14 names of the people on that number one crew. 15 Mark Bolen was on that crew. 16 I'm trying to think of who all was not 17 with me. Got so many new guys and such a big 18 turnaround. 19 **Q**. I understand. 20 I think at that time Tommy Dove was on 21 that crew at one time or another. Scott Kingery. 22 Keenrey? Q. 23

Kingery, K-i-n-g-e-r-y.

24

1	That's really about all. I can't say that
2	a hundred percent.
3	Q. What about the number two crew as of April
4	5th?
5	A. Jim Aurednik, James Thomas, Larry
6	Ferguson. My crew has changed, too, a hundred
7	times since then. Mike Alexander. And I had Tommy
8	Dove on my crew at that time. Yeah, Tommy Dove.
9	Q. Has he since moved to number one, is that
LO	
L1	A. No. Yes, he has since moved to number
L2	one. We've kind of changed the whole way we're
L3	doing things now. It's not just number one, number
L 4	two team. We're actually putting a team at
L5	Mammoth, a team in Logan, a team at Mt. Hope and a
L6	team at Performance. So we'll have four different
L 7	teams instead of just the two.
L8	MR. BABINGTON: Okay. Let's take
L9	a quick five-minute break. Off the
20	record.
21	(Break.)
22	MR. O'BRIEN: I just have one
23	question. And I may have asked, or
24	someone else, and if we did, bear with us.

What is your job title? 1 THE WITNESS: Mine rescue. 2 MR. O'BRIEN: Just mine rescue 3 member? 4 THE WITNESS: Mine rescue is my 5 job title. Tier 1. 6 7 **EXAMINATION** BY MR. MCATEER: 8 Mr. Aurednik, to clarify, Massey has established prior to April 5th in part of their 10 organization mine rescue group. 11 Α. Yes. 12 And that group, as I understand it, serves 13 Q. a function of being prepared to conduct mine rescue 14 efforts, but as well these other instances that you 15 described? 16 Α. 17 Yes. That being compliance assistance? 0. 18 There's not really a job title to that. 19 Α. mean, we just go and do S1 safety audits. 20 Safety audits. Okay. Q. 21 22 Α. And try to reduce our violations. And number two, in mine visits, in order 23 0. to comply with the --24

A. Correct.

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Q. -- Miner Act.

And then number three, and maybe I'm making this one up, what these fellows on the 5th of April, they were going in to help out, it was intended to help out at Upper Big Branch, but they went someplace else?

- A. As far as I know, yes.
- Q. But that wasn't one of these two, wasn't the audit, safety audit, or nor this mine visit?
 - A. No.
 - Q. But it was just to --
- A. As I finish my audits for the quarter for this mines, I would go back and go over my audits to the most, the mines that seems to be struggling the most and I would go to that mines and try to help out and reduce their numbers of violations.
 - Q. And that's what this --
 - A. That is, yes.
- Q. And do you remember when the last time this one was audited at UBB?
 - A. No.
- Q. Because that would be the -- team number one --

1	A. At one time I was stationed at the
2	Performance station on what we called slack days.
3	There wasn't a whole lot going on. Performance is
4	right there in our back door, UBB was, so we would
5	go to UBB because it was closer, it was right
6	there.
7	MR. MCCUSKEY: Davitt, as a
8	clarification, I think he did say that, I
9	remember his testimony earlier was that he
10	believed that the safety audit for the
11	quarter had been performed at Upper Big
12	Branch.
13	THE WITNESS: Yes, I believe it
14	had already been done.
15	MR. MCCUSKEY: Because you asked
16	when it had been done.
17	MR. MCATEER: He said that and I
18	just didn't know whether he knew who did
19	it when it was done.
20	A. No, I would not have, because like I said
21	
22	Q. But it would have been the alternative
23	team at number one?
24	A. Yes, it would have been the other team,
	1

because, obviously, it wasn't my mines. 1 Exactly. Okay. 2 Q. It should have been done sometime between 3 January and March, because that's the first 4 quarter. And we try to finish every mines for 5 every quarter. 6 7 MR. MCATEER: That's it. EXAMINATION 8 BY MR. SHERER: 9 I have got a few clarification questions, 10 **Q**. Mr. Aurednik. When you were going in, did you have 11 any indication how many miners were missing at that 12 time? 13 When I first went in? 14 Uh-huh. 0. 15 No, not until I reached 78 break and 16 established communication from there that I had an 17 idea of how many miners were missing. 18 Do you recall what the first estimate was? 19 Q. Α. No. 20 Did you have some sort of check-in when 21 Q. you were going in the mines? 22 Α. Yes. 23

When you were going in the mines, did you

24

Q.

know that there were other people underground at 1 that point in time, particularly Mr. Blanchard and 2 Whitehead? 3 Α. Yes. And did Mr. Asbury tell you that? Q. 5 I don't think it was Mr. Asbury, but I 6 7 cannot recall who it was that told me that. Q. Okay. Thank you. 8 You mentioned that you ran into Mr. Blanchard and Whitehead somewhere around 78 10 break initially and they kind of gave you a little 11 briefing of what they had found. Do you know why 12 they had come back out to that point? Did they 13 mention that? 14 No, they didn't, but from what I assumed, 15 Α. you know, the CO was pretty much what drove them 16 17 out. Q. Okay. 18 And they were both entirely exhausted. 19 Α. Okay. Sure. 20 Q. You said that you had backup when you went 21 22 inby 78 break. Who was that backup? Shane McPherson and two other people had 23

already arrived to 78 break before we started going

inby. 1 And they were mine rescue team members? Q. Yes. A. 3 In your initial expedition inby 78 break, Q. it was just two people, yourself and Mr. Bolen, I 5 think you mentioned. 6 Α. Yes. Q. Do you have standard operating procedures 8 or checklists or something for your safety audits that you use? 10 No. Federal regulations and state laws. 11 Α. Q. Okay. 12 And S1 guidelines. That's pretty much 13 Α. what we used. 14 And you had mentioned that you reported 15 Q. the results of the safety audits to the mine 16 superintendent and president. 9	EXAMINATION
10	BY MR. BABINGTON:
11	Q. One quick one. For these safety reports
12	that you, the quarterly safety reports, how long
13	have you been, prior to April 5th, how long have
14	you been doing those quarterly safety reports. I
15	know you didn't do them for UBB.
16	A. Since July of '08.
17	Q. Since July of '08.
18	A. Somewhere in that time frame.
19	Q. Okay.
20	A. July to December we started gathering this
21	information and began doing our audits.
22	MR. BABINGTON: Eric, MSHA is
23	going to request those quarterly safety
24	reports for UBB from July 2008 through

April 5th.
John, do you have anything else?
MR. MCCUSKEY: Just a couple of
clarifications, if I may.
Eric had used the phrase you went
back into the mine of your only violation,
and I think you meant volition, because
you then followed up and said of your own
freewill. But if I'm correct, I'd like to
make sure
MR. SILKWOOD: You're absolutely
correct.
MR. MCCUSKEY: You mean
volition.
MR. SHERER: Violation is just a
Fraudulent slip.
MR. MCCUSKEY: A Fraudulent or a
Freudian slip? Now you made another
slip.
Anyway. Okay. I want to make
sure that was clear.
And secondly, I'll ask the
witness to actually clarify, but I believe
there was an occasion when he was referred

1	to as a compliance officer and I'll ask

15	was one governmental employee there and I
16	believe you said a Mr. Kinder?
17	THE WITNESS: John Kinder.
18	MR. MCCUSKEY: Now did Mr. Kinder
19	know you were going into the mine?
20	THE WITNESS: Yes.
21	MR. MCCUSKEY: He did. He saw
22	you?
23	THE WITNESS: He told me to be
24	safe and do what we were trained to do.

1	MR. MCCUSKEY: So he made a
2	comment to you. And what was that?
3	THE WITNESS: Just to be safe and
4	do what we were trained to do.
5	MR. MCCUSKEY: Did he make any
6	effort to stop you?
7	THE WITNESS: No.
8	MR. MCCUSKEY: That's all I
9	wanted to know. And that's all I have.
10	MR. MCATEER: No other questions.
11	MR. BABINGTON: Bill, you want
12	to
13	MR. MCATEER: It's your turn,
14	Bill.
15	MR. TUCKER: Just request the
16	same audits that you provide MSHA.
17	MR. MCATEER: Same here, Eric.
18	MR. TUCKER: And I would like to
19	say that we greatly appreciate the work
20	you do, Jimmy, and don't take for
21	granted. It's greatly appreciated.
22	MR. BABINGTON: And usually we
23	give the witness an opportunity to make a
24	statement at the end. Is there anything

1	you'd like to add?
2	THE WITNESS: No.
3	MR. BABINGTON: Well, if there's
4	nothing else, thank you for coming in, and
5	let's go off the record.
6	MR. MCCUSKEY: Before we go off
7	the record. Even though Bill has already
8	said you're not getting one, am I correct
9	that you would like to have a transcript
