- 3 ATTORNEY HAMPTON:
- 4 My name is Polly Hampton. Today is June
- 5 10th, 2010. I am with the Office of the Solicitor,
- 6 U.S. Department of Labor. With me is John Godsey, an
- 7 accident investigator with the Mine Safety and Health
- 8 Administration, MSHA, an agency of the United States
- 9 Department of Labor. Also present are several people
- from the State of West Virginia. I ask that they
- 11 state their appearance for the record.
- 12 MR. FARLEY:
- 13 I'm Terry Farley, with the West Virginia
- Office of Miners' Health, Safety and Training.
- 15 ATTORNEY HAMPTON:
- 16 And by several I mean one. There are
- actually several members of the investigation team
- also present in the room today, and Mr. Godsey will be
- 19 conducting the initial part of the questioning today.
- 20 All members of the Mine Safety and Health
- 21 Accident Investigation Team and all members of the
- 22 State of West Virginia Accident Investigation Team
- 23 participating in the investigation of the Upper Big
- 24 Branch Mine explosion shall keep confidential all
- 25 information that is gathered from each witness who

- 1 voluntarily provides a statement until the witness
- 2 statements are officially released. MSHA and the
- 3 State of West Virginia shall keep this information
- 4 confidential so that other ongoing enforcement
- 5 activities are not prejudiced or jeopardized by a
- 6 premature release of information. This
- 7 confidentiality requirement shall not preclude
- 8 investigation team members from sharing information
- 9 with each other or with other law enforcement
- 10 officials. Your participation in this interview
- 11 constitutes your agreement to keep this information
- 12 confidential.
- 13 Government investigators and specialists
- have been assigned to investigate the conditions,
- 15 events and circumstances surrounding the fatalities
- that occurred at the Upper Big Branch Mine-South on
- 17 April 5th, 2010. The investigation is being conducted
- 18 by MSHA under Section 103(a) of the Federal Mine
- 19 Safety and Health Act and the West Virginia Office of
- 20 Miners' Health, Safety and Training. We appreciate
- 21 your assistance in the investigation. You may have a
- 22 personal attorney present during the taking of the
- 23 statement or another personal representative, if MSHA
- has permitted it, and may consult with your attorney
- or the representative at that time. Your statement is

- 1 completely voluntary. You may refuse to answer any
- 2 question and you may terminate your interview at any
- 3 time or request a break at any time. Since this is
- 4 not an adversarial proceeding, formal Cross
- 5 Examination will not be permitted. However, if you
- 6 had a personal legal representative, that person could
- 7 ask clarifying questions. Just for the record, do you
- 8 have a personal representative here today?
- 9 MR. CRADDOCK:
- 10 No, I do not.
- 11 ATTORNEY HAMPTON:
- 12 Your identity and the content of this
- conversation will be made public at the conclusion of
- the interview process and may be included in the
- 15 public report of the accident, unless you request that
- 16 your identify remain confidential or your information
- will otherwise jeopardize a potential criminal
- investigation. If you request us to keep your
- 19 identity confidential, we will do so to the extent
- 20 permitted by law. That means that if a Judge orders
- 21 us to reveal your name or if another law requires us
- to reveal your name or if we need to reveal your name
- for other law enforcement purposes, we may do so.
- Also, there may be a need to use the information you
- 25 provide to us or other information we may ask you to

- 1 provide in the future, in other investigations into
- 2 hearings about the explosion. Do you understand or
- 3 have any questions?
- 4 MR. CRADDOCK:
- 5 No, no questions, and I understand.
- 6 ATTORNEY HAMPTON:
- 7 After the investigation is complete, MSHA
- 8 will issue a public report detailing the nature and
- 9 causes of the fatalities in the hope that greater
- 10 awareness about the causes of accidents can reduce
- their occurrence in the future. Information obtained
- through witness interviews is frequently included in
- these reports. Since we will be interviewing other
- individuals, we request that you not discuss your
- testimony with any person aside from a personal
- 16 representative or counsel.
- 17 A court reporter will record your
- interview. Please speak loudly and clearly. If you
- 19 do not understand a question, please ask the
- 20 questioner to rephrase it. Please answer each
- 21 question as fully as you can, including any
- information you have learned from someone else. I
- would like to thank you in advance for your appearance
- here. We appreciate your assistance in this
- 25 investigation. Your cooperation is critical in making

- 1 the nation's mines safer.
- 2 After we have finished asking questions,
- 3 you will have an opportunity to make a statement and
- 4 provide us with any other information that you believe
- 5 to be important. If at any time after the interview
- 6 you recall any additional information that you believe
- 7 might be useful, please contact or have a
- 8 representative contact, as the case may be, Norman
- 9 Page at the telephone number or e-mail address
- 10 provided to you in the letter that I gave you earlier.
- 11 Any statements given by miner witnesses
- to MSHA are considered to be an exercise of statutory
- rights and protected activity under Section 105(c) of
- 14 the Mine Act. If you believe any discharge,
- 15 discrimination or other adverse action is taken
- against you as a result of your cooperation with this
- investigation, you are encouraged to immediately
- contact MSHA and file a complaint under Section 105(c)
- 19 of the Act. You may swear in the witness.

- 24 ATTORNEY HAMPTON:
- 25 Mr. Godsey?

- 1 EXAMINATION
- 2 BY MR. GODSEY:
- Q. Mr. Craddock, state your full name ---
- 4 A. William ---.
- 5 Q. --- and spell your last name.
- 6 A. William G. Craddock, C-R-A-D-D-O-C-K.
- 7 O. Your home address?
- 8 A.
- 9
- 10 Q. Okay. Your telephone number?
- 11 A.
- 12 Q. Are you appearing here today voluntarily?
- 13 A. Yes, I am.
- Q. Has anyone made any promises to you for giving
- this interview or offered you any rewards in
- exchanging for making your statement? Has anyone
- threatened you or warned you not to provide this
- 18 statement?
- 19 A. No, sir.
- 20 Q. How many years of mining experience do you have?
- 21 A. About six-and-a-half, seven, but they're --- I
- don't know if I'm supposed to clarify. They've been
- 23 separated. I worked from '75, December, to June of
- 24 '79. And because of the striking, I got out of the
- 25 mining industry and I did not get back into it until

- 1 August of 2008. August 26th is when I was hired on by
- 2 Performance Coal Company until the present day,
- 3 so ---.
- 4 Q. Who did you work for? You said ---.
- 5 A. Westmoreland Coal Company.
- 6 Q. Westmoreland Coal Company?
- 7 A. Yes, during the '70s.
- 8 Q. Was that in Eccles or ---?
- 9 A. Winding Gulf, down that way, sir.
- 10 Q. Do you have any mining certification for
- 11 specialized training?
- 12 A. I'm a certified electrician underground.
- Q. Did you go through the Massey training program?
- 14 A. Yes, I did, sir.
- 15 O. When did you do that?
- 16 A. From October of 2008 until October of 2009.
- Q. Did you have to sign a contract?
- 18 A. Yes, I did.
- 19 Q. How long was that for?
- 20 A. Three years.
- Q. What was the stipulation?
- 22 A. Just stating that I would agree to work for Massey
- because they're paying for my schooling and everything
- 24 else and the expense that they've put out, that I
- 25 would continue to work for them for three years.

- 1 Q. What if you quit?
- 2 A. If I understand it, then we would have to pay back
- 3 the schooling fees. That's the way I understood it.
- 4 Q. Are you presently employed?
- 5 A. Yes, I am.
- 6 Q. Where are you?
- 7 A. Performance Coal Company, UBB.
- 8 Q. And you told us you started --- when did you start
- 9 at UBB? You told me once.
- 10 A. August --- I believe it's August 26th of 2008,
- 11 sir.
- 12 Q. And what is your present job title?
- 13 A. Outby electrician.
- Q. And outby, do you mean by ---?
- 15 A. I work in the motor barn, taking care of mantrips,
- Jeeps, that type of equipment, the chargers that
- 17 charge them. And during the --- that's where I'm at
- now, sir, and that was the same title. But during the
- and prior to the explosion, Mondays, Wednesdays and
- 20 Fridays I would go to the Ellis side and spend my day
- 21 there to take care of the mantrips and the Jeeps and
- the motors, anything that was on that side.
- 23 Q. How often would you go underground?
- 24 A. That --- on the Ellis side, I would have to go
- 25 under like four or five breaks, and once a week I

- 1 would go about 15 breaks to look at the chargers up at
- 2 Ellis Five Head.
- Q. How long did it tae you to perform these duties?
- 4 A. Well, because of the nature of the mantrips and
- 5 the way they come out, I would spend my day there on
- 6 the Ellis side, in and out.
- 7 Q. What were the most --- what were all the problems
- 8 that you had with them?
- 9 A. Well, it was maintenance service, greasing,
- 10 oiling, minor stuff. We had no facilities to take
- 11 care of major, so we would transfer to the other side
- in the event of something --- you know, a major
- 13 failure.
- Q. On the UBB side, how far --- did you ever travel
- 15 underground?
- 16 A. Ninety-nine (99) percent of the time, no, sir.
- 17 Twice I had to go up towards Three section to get a
- 18 mantrip that would not run.
- 19 O. And what is Three section?
- 20 A. That's on the south side of the mines, the other
- side of the mountain. There's two portals.
- Q. Are you talking about the barrier section?
- 23 A. No, barrier's --- yes, I think they --- didn't
- they call it --- they changed the name. It confused
- 25 me, sir. I believe it ---.

- 1 Q. Who is your immediate supervisor?
- 2 A. I would have to say --- well, that's a good
- 3 question because I pretty much work for Wayne, but
- 4 Paul Thompson I would say would be my immediate
- 5 supervisor.
- 6 Q. And who is he, Paul?
- 7 A. Paul's like over all the electricians at our
- 8 mines, so I would have to say him. But normally I
- 9 never see Paul. Wayne ---.
- 10 Q. Wayne?
- 11 A. Persinger or, you know, they usually --- I pretty
- much work by myself. I have very little intervention
- with anybody.
- Q. Pretty good worker.
- 15 A. Well, you know, he'll come to me if he needs help
- and I don't have anything to do. Like right now I
- have a lot of intervention with Wayne. But most of
- 18 the time when we're running coal I got nobody --- I do
- 19 my own thing. I'm sorry. That's probably not the
- 20 correct word, but ---.
- 21 Q. That's all right. What was your work schedule for
- the week of the accident? What shift were you
- working?
- 24 A. I was always dayshift, and most of the time we
- 25 would start at 3:00 in the morning, 3:00 to 1:00, 3:00

- to 2:00. It depends on what was going on. We'd
- 2 typically start at 3:00, 3:30, to let's just say 1:30,
- 3 2:30.
- 4 Q. Okay. And how many days a week did you do that?
- 5 A. Five to six.
- 6 Q. And usually about what time did you leave the
- 7 property?
- 8 A. If I was on the Ellis side, I would pretty much
- 9 leave the property around --- between 2:15, 2:25, in
- 10 that range. Sometimes I'd get out ---.
- 11 Q. Yes, sir.
- 12 A. Sometimes I'd get out of there by 2:05.
- Q. What was the last day you worked before the
- 14 explosion?
- 15 A. The day of the explosion, sir.
- 16 Q. Do you know if they ran the longwall during that
- 17 weekend?
- 18 A. I was off Friday, Saturday and Sunday. I do not
- 19 know for sure. I really couldn't answer honestly.
- Q. Do they ever shut the longwall down, like holidays
- 21 and ---?
- 22 A. Most of the time the wall ran, most of the time.
- I didn't know a whole lot about it. You'd hear
- intervention with people, but I know that they ran it
- 25 two shifts and maintenance on the third shift. They

- 1 would run weekends when they could. But that's ---
- 2 you know, that's what I hear just passing with
- 3 somebody.
- 4 Q. Have you ever heard of the longwall being down?
- 5 The foreman shut the section down for something and
- 6 they called outside and management tells them to go
- 7 back and run coal, they're down for a short hour or
- 8 something like that, any of the sections?
- 9 A. No, I never heard that, sir.
- 10 Q. Have you performed any other jobs at the mine
- 11 other than electrical work?
- 12 A. Basically I was hired on as an electrician,
- mechanical/electrical. The few times while I was a
- trainee or something, if I --- I'd help somebody do
- something, but --- you know, if I happened to be near
- and there was nothing for me to do, I'd help them
- 17 stack block or something. But I was hired on as an
- 18 electrician. That's mainly what I did.
- 19 Q. Outside or whenever you had --- you all would get
- 20 with your fellow miners, did you all ever talk about
- 21 conditions in the mine? Anybody ever say that they
- 22 was concerned about working in a certain place or a
- 23 certain area of the mine?
- A. Just at the top was as little unstable, up in the
- area of the sections that were driving for the wall.

- 1 You'd hear that all the time. They were watching it,
- 2 but you know, I never really heard anybody say
- anything other than that. But that's pretty much
- 4 mining. But up there it was a little bit worse. And
- 5 sometimes you'd hear them say that the bottom would
- 6 buckle a little bit or something.
- 7 Q. Well, talking about bottom heaving, did you ever
- 8 hear any --- ever have a floor outburst or anything
- 9 while you were there?
- 10 A. No, sir.
- 11 Q. What about the pumps behind the longwall? They
- 12 had quite a bit of water I understand. Who maintained
- the pumps behind there? Did you ever go back there?
- 14 A. No, sir. I don't know a lot about the pumps or
- even what they --- I know they had some air pumps back
- there, and Jeremy Burdoff was basically maintaining
- those, him and two trainees. I'd talk to Jeremy when
- 18 he'd go by me like Monday, Wednesdays and Fridays.
- 19 We'd talk a little bit, but basically he --- he's the
- only one that I know about the air pumps. Any other
- 21 pumps that was up in there would be took care of by
- the electricians in that area.
- Q. Did he ever talk to you about water --- working on
- water that was chest deep or something?
- 25 A. Yeah. He said the water is pretty deep up there.

- 1 Q. Do you know anybody getting injured up there
- 2 or ---?
- A. No, not that I could recall. I mean, there's
- 4 always injuries in a mine. You know, to recall one
- 5 specifically because of that water, no.
- 6 Q. Talking about injuries, did you have a lot of
- 7 people that was on light duty or several miners on
- 8 light duty?
- 9 A. No, not that I --- while I was there, there was a
- 10 couple put on light duty. And the names --- I really
- 11 can't recall the names right there. But there was a
- couple, but I wouldn't say an extraordinary lot of
- 13 them, no, sir.
- 14 Q. Okay. Have you ever been injured?
- 15 A. No, sir.
- 16 O. Okay.
- 17 A. Injured, meaning? I'm an electrician. An
- occasional little cut or nick or something.
- 19 Q. Did you ever have to go to the hospital?
- 20 A. No, sir. No, sir.
- 21 Q. Okay.
- 22 A. I just want to make sure I'm trying to answer
- 23 truthfully.
- Q. Have you ever heard any of the men talking about
- any of the ventilation problems they've had at any of

- 1 the sections?
- 2 A. Off and on you'd hear ---.
- 3 Q. I mean low air.
- A. Yeah, off and on you'd hear bath house rumors
- 5 where they were trying to get the air right and that
- 6 they couldn't run because they didn't have enough air.
- 7 They were working on it. And that's something that
- 8 had been an ongoing thing, taking --- trying to get
- 9 the air change up in the area.
- 10 Q. Are you aware of any time that they made any
- 11 unplanned or unapproved ventilation changes for people
- 12 underground?
- 13 A. No, sir. Like I say, I wasn't involved in that
- part of it. You'd just hear them where they're
- working on the air or they're having trouble and MSHA
- 16 would have them --- pull them out if the air wasn't
- 17 right or something like that. But in my job, you
- 18 know, you hear a little bit of bath house rumors that
- 19 go on. But if I listened to everything, I'd never get
- 20 my job done, so ---.
- 21 Q. What is the extent or what areas have you visited
- in UBB?
- 23 A. Well, I've been, at one point or another, down the
- 24 mainline all the way through to the Glory Hole, a
- little bit past it, where the longwall first started

- 1 mining. And I'm not an expert on the map, but where
- 2 they first started, I took in the last little bit of
- 3 my training. It just so happened they needed me, and
- 4 I was helping up in that area a little bit with
- 5 miscellaneous stuff, like getting a miner, working on
- 6 a miner, doing this and that. And when they were
- 7 setting up the new One section, the wall had already
- 8 started running, and we were setting up the new One
- 9 section to start driving for the next wall, I helped
- 10 put in the tailpiece, the belt head, stuff like that.
- 11 Mainly I helped put in the fire suppression, the
- 12 pipes down the belt. Again, I was a trainee and I
- helped put in the rock box. And it was shortly after
- that I tested out, and then I was immediately moved
- outside, which is where they were planning to put me.
- 16 Q. How many times or can you imagine how close was
- 17 you up there at the longwall?
- 18 A. Never been on the wall.
- 19 Q. I mean, setting up, traveling up there, how many
- times have you traveled up to the track entry?
- 21 A. Before the wall ever ran I've probably been up
- there six times.
- 23 Q. Do you remember any water problems they had up
- 24 there?
- 25 A. Basically the last time I was up on the wall they

- were --- and I didn't even walk over to it, they
- were --- it was wet up there in that area. Everything
- 3 was wet, damp, wet. There was no dust that I can
- 4 remember in my mind in that area. When they first set
- 5 up --- were setting up the wall, it hadn't ran yet,
- 6 they were still doing the borehole for the fan, for
- 7 the Bundytown (sic) fan I think is the correct ---. I
- 8 was close enough to hear the borehole running, but I
- 9 never walked over to it. Again, we were working on a
- 10 miner or shuttle cars or something like that. We were
- just helping out. I was just like an extra loaned
- 12 out.
- 13 Q. What about roof conditions up there, on the track?
- 14 A. Again, --- I'm trying to --- I don't want to get
- the old Two section mixed up because that come around
- for the tailgate. You could see occasionally where
- the metal --- the metal supports along the belt, you
- 18 could see where they had bowed them a little bit and
- they were replacing them as necessary. I've seen that
- 20 a couple times. But that's mining. You see it off
- and on.
- 22 Q. About the floor, did you see any floor heaving up
- there?
- A. When --- the longwall had already been running and
- 25 --- I'm trying to think now. We went up there --- I

- 1 wasn't working, so I'm trying to be careful. We went
- 2 up there to get a --- what was it? They sent us up
- 3 there to get something, and I'm trying to think of
- 4 what it was. That's when I was working on the new One
- 5 section. We weren't working up there. We were sent
- 6 up there to find a cable or pull a cable. They needed
- 7 a cable on a cathead or something, and the wall was on
- 8 the side. We were there, and when we were getting the
- 9 cable, you could see where they were --- the bottom
- 10 had cracked a little bit and they had an area walled
- off where they didn't want no men to go. But I can't
- 12 --- I was only there once. Again, I wasn't working up
- there, so --- other than they had sent us to try to
- get a cable, pull a cable out.
- 15 O. Do you know about when that was?
- 16 A. The wall hadn't been running very long at all.
- 17 They were still on their first panel, I believe.
- 18 Q. Was in maybe September of last year, '09, or
- 19 something?
- 20 A. Well, it would have had to have been the last ---
- about the last month, like I say, I was floating. I
- 22 wasn't on Three. It would have been in that range of
- 23 --- around September, because October 6th I was no
- longer underground. I was outside.
- Q. Have you been to the Glory Hole?

- 1 A. I've been to the Glory Hole off and on a few
- times. December of '08 --- Thanksgiving of '08, these
- dates are hard to remember, we worked on the actual
- 4 feeder that the Glory Hole drops down into when it was
- 5 still running.
- 6 Q. Do you remember any methane readings or oxygen?
- 7 A. No. I had a detector. I can tell you it was hot,
- 8 very warm, but we did have a detector.
- 9 Q. Why was it warm? I mean, ---.
- 10 A. Well, the equipment running there and just not a
- lot of air ventilation at that time. They hadn't put
- 12 the Bundytown fan online.
- 13 Q. Okay.
- 14 A. It was very warm up there, if I had to guess, 85
- or --- it was warm. You shed your shirt. You worked
- in a T-shirt and put your coveralls with your stripes
- 17 back on. It was hot.
- 18 O. Have you been to Eight North?
- 19 A. Eight North?
- 20 Q. Up there inby the Glory Hole?
- 21 A. I can't say yes or no. I know this sounds ---I
- 22 went up twice to where they were setting up One in
- that area because in behind the power center where the
- 24 track used to be they had cut across. I had to
- 25 service a motor and I walked up and around, but I

- 1 couldn't tell you if it was Eight North.
- 2 Q. Okay.
- 3 A. It was a little bit past the Glory Hole, just a
- 4 little bit, not much, in that area, if I recollect. I
- 5 only went up there to --- there was a motor trapped in
- 6 there because they had cut the track out and they were
- 7 using it to fire boss the area behind it, and they ---
- 8 I had to go up there. I was available, so I went up
- 9 there twice, I believe, to take a look at it, sir.
- 10 Q. How has the rock dusting been in those areas?
- 11 A. I didn't pay a lot of attention, but I know that
- they were pretty religious about --- I don't know
- about the back areas. I really didn't pay a lot of
- 14 attention. I didn't get into that that much, sir, but
- 15 I know they ran the track duster all the time.
- 16 Q. Have you been to 22 Headgate section?
- 17 A. See, these numbers --- to me, after they were up
- and operating, no, I don't think so.
- 19 Q. Do you remember when you traveled up there about
- when you got to 78 Crosscut, did you ever go through
- any equipment doors where you went from neutral into
- 22 the intake back into the neutral?
- 23 A. Oh, those four doors?
- 24 O. Yeah.
- 25 A. Oh, yeah, went through them all.

- 1 Q. Did you ever find any of them open, any of them
- 2 left open?
- 3 A. Probably about eight months ago, when one was
- damaged, one was open, but all the others were okay.
- 5 And it was fixed. I want to say Billy graham come ---
- 6 I believe it was Billy Graham come back and fixed it.
- But to come through them open, I've never seen them
- 8 open myself. And I got to say that I religiously ---
- 9 I hated it when I was sent by myself because you got
- 10 to get off, open, close, get off, open and close. But
- it's very serious, so I definitely did --- you know, I
- would open and close them. But I've never come
- through there where they were open, sir.
- 14 Q. Have you ever seen a motor crew go through there?
- 15 A. No, because, again, I'm not up there that often.
- 16 They would --- the few times I was up there, they had
- 17 already come through or would be coming through after
- 18 us.
- 19 Q. Are you aware of any conditions which required all
- or portions of the mine to be evacuated?
- 21 A. While I was there --- one time when I was there we
- 22 had a fan go down. They pulled everybody out. The
- 23 motor went out on the north fan, UBB North fan, and
- they pulled everybody out of the mines.
- Q. Any time for methane or air direction, air going

- in the wrong direction?
- 2 A. Well, when they were doing their air changes, they
- 3 wouldn't let nobody go in. But to pull people out,
- 4 the only time I actually was at the mines when they
- 5 did it was when that fan went down. And you know
- 6 what, there was another time that we couldn't go in
- 7 around --- when all that big snowstorm hit, the
- 8 Bundytown fan went down. It kept going offline. They
- 9 wouldn't let nobody go in. So I remember those two
- 10 times. And then I heard --- back up a couple years.
- I can't tell you exactly, before my time. When the
- wall was running before --- not this time they're
- here, when it was running before I heard they hit a
- gas well or a gas pocket, and they pulled everybody
- out of the mines for a minimum of three days. The
- 16 company immediately shut it down and said, get out
- 17 now. That's what I heard the last time the longwall
- was here.
- 19 Q. Do you remember when that was?
- 20 A. No, sir. I wasn't --- I didn't work at the mines.
- I only heard my friend telling me, John Cooper, he's
- 22 no longer at this mines. He's --- he works for
- 23 Massey. But he told me that they said --- bath house
- 24 rumor, said it sounded like a jet engine when it was
- 25 going off. He said they immediately pulled everybody

- 1 out of the whole mines, and it was down for three days
- 2 or more because of it.
- 3 Q. Are you aware any time that oncoming shifts were
- 4 delayed or cancelled because of safety issues?
- 5 A. Well, again the Bundytown fan was offline. MSHA
- 6 wouldn't let them go in or the State wouldn't let them
- 7 go in because of something. That would happen off and
- 8 on. Not that often, but it did happen.
- 9 Q. What about any concern --- I may have asked you
- 10 this, but maybe I haven't. Any concerns anybody had
- 11 with the ventilation system? I mean, ---.
- 12 A. Well, a couple times --- I don't know if it was
- the State or the Federal, they weren't happy with the
- 14 way the ventilation was in an area or --- I don't know
- if it was the area or whatever. I can't remember the
- 16 actual areas, but it's happened probably while I was
- there two or three times.
- 18 O. Did anybody ever discuss with you or say anything
- 19 to you about being scared of going underground?
- 20 A. Not to me personally, no, sir.
- 21 Q. Did you ever work on the carbon monoxide system,
- 22 monitoring system?
- 23 A. The CO system?
- 24 O. Yes.
- 25 A. One night I was helping Billy Graham. We were

- 1 trying --- this was back when I was a trainee. I was
- 2 helping him. I was walking, looking for cuts in the
- 3 cable. We had a CO system that --- I was walking the
- 4 UBB --- Lower Big Branch, LBB area, along the belt in
- 5 that range, down the mainline. I'd go in and out, and
- 6 I was just trying to look for a cut in the cable. It
- 7 ended up being on the other side of the mountain, Tree
- 8 section. Somebody had ran across it with a scoop and
- 9 had cut the cable, and Virgil fixed it when he came
- in. But that's the only time I had ever touched it.
- 11 Q. Who maintains the system?
- 12 A. Virgil bowman, and I think Tom Sheet helps him,
- 13 but I know Virgil Bowman.
- Q. Do you ever look at the monitor outside on the CO
- 15 system?
- 16 A. I glanced at it. The one downstairs, the big one,
- I built the brackets and raised it up, but I didn't
- 18 actually install it.
- 19 Q. What are the spacing of the CO monitors
- 20 underground?
- 21 A. I couldn't recall that, sir. I know on a section
- 22 we got one at the belt head and we would put one at
- 23 the tailpiece. I don't know the actual spacing
- 24 between them.
- Q. Did you ever have to take a piece of equipment out

- 1 of service?
- 2 A. As a trainee, I wouldn't --- that wasn't my
- 3 responsibility. As an outby electrician, several
- 4 times we took rides out of service because we felt
- 5 they were unsafe.
- 6 Q. Did anybody say anything to you for that?
- 7 A. Oh, no. You'd get the section bosses, grumbling
- 8 and griping a little bit. You know what I mean? Oh,
- 9 that ain't going to hurt nothing. So you know what,
- then you sign the book. But no, no upper management
- has ever said anything to me ever about that, sir.
- 12 Q. You're on the surface a lot. When an inspector
- pulls up at the guardhouse, do they --- either a State
- or Federal, does the guard --- do they notify the mine
- office that he's on his way up?
- 16 A. I'm not aware of it, sir. I'm not --- I can't say
- it doesn't happen, but I'm not aware of it. Most of
- 18 the time, being outby, Roger Cantley was the man that
- 19 used to have my position, and he's more or less ---
- 20 because of his after all this
- 21 . He had his office downstairs. And most of
- 22 your inspectors that would come through, they'd talk
- 23 to us every day, all the time.
- 24 Q. Okay.
- 25 A. It was just like very friendly with them because,

- 1 you know --- and if they wanted us to do something, I
- 2 never had a problem doing it.
- 3 Q. Okay.
- 4 A. But they --- you know, I can't say it didn't
- 5 happen, but I'm not aware of it.
- 6 Q. Okay.
- 7 MR. FARLEY:
- 8 I don't think I have any questions for
- 9 Mr. Craddock.
- 10 BY MR. GODSEY:
- 11 Q. Was mine ventilation adequate at all times when
- 12 you were underground?
- 13 A. The section I worked on, Three, as a trainee, it
- 14 was above adequate. I like froze to death, it had so
- much air. They actually cut it back some. I'll tell
- 16 you what, December of '08, and it --- and I hope it's
- okay to tell it, it was so cold and so much air coming
- 18 across, I was welding on a miner back --- a couple
- 19 breaks back, like you're supposed to be and
- 20 everything. They had sent me welding the bits and I'm
- 21 underground, and it was so cold, with my welding
- gloves, I'd take them off and I'd put my fingers like
- this about every 15 minutes. When I made my first
- 24 pass --- and I'm a good welder. When I made my first
- 25 pass, I started the second pass, the ripper head was

- 1 so cold that the first pass cracked. I never have
- welds cracked. And so I had to take the torch and
- 3 warm it up. On that side of the mountain they had no
- 4 air problems at all. On the other side, as a trainee,
- 5 like I said, the Glory Hole didn't have a lot of air
- 6 moving there, but I had a gas detector and never did
- 7 see no gas. It was hot. That side of the mountain,
- 8 before they put the Bundytown fan on, did not have a
- 9 lot of --- what I would consider a lot of air. But
- 10 I'm not an expert now.
- 11 Q. Do you presently do any welding underground?
- 12 A. Not right now, no, sir. I'm an outby electrician.
- Q. Were any major ventilation changes made while
- miners were underground, are you aware of?
- 15 A. I have heard rumor a couple times they did it and
- 16 MSHA slapped --- or the State, either one, I can't
- 17 remember which, slapped their hand real good and made
- 18 them pull everybody out. I heard the rumor of that,
- 19 and I know that something went on there. I didn't
- 20 know a whole lot, but I heard that they were making
- 21 something one time, twice. I couldn't tell you days,
- but --- again, Roger and I kind of stayed to ourself.
- We had so much to do. Two men --- think about it. A
- section guy's got a few pieces of equipment, and it's
- 25 a lot. We had 27 Jeeps, rides and motors for two of

- 1 us to take care of.
- Q. When you were on the section, did you ever see
- 3 anybody take a miner cut without using curtain?
- 4 A. I was only in production probably --- I'd help
- 5 them out maybe --- the whole time I was an
- 6 electrician, after I was an electrician and they sent
- 7 me up there, I was --- probably no more than six, half
- 8 a dozen times. And the times that I was up in the
- 9 face, sir, they had their curtain there, I helped them
- 10 hang it. But most of the time, again, that wasn't my
- 11 job.
- 12 Q. When you were up there, did you ever see a methane
- monitor bridged on a miner or plastic ---?
- 14 A. No, sir. I've heard that. I've heard people say
- that --- again, our people are talking between
- theirselves. Did you ever see anybody ---? No, sir.
- I have never seen anybody. The company has never told
- us to do it. In fact, Massey I think has --- I've
- 19 been to different places. Massey has --- I mean, and
- 20 I've been around the classes, electrical training
- 21 classes, national technical schools, I took their week
- 22 class. I've never seen a better school for training.
- 23 And they tell you right then and there, if you're ever
- caught bridging something out, you're fired. On the
- spot you're fired. They're real strict. And I'll be

- 1 --- myself, if I'm going to take a chance of losing my
- license for doing it and to hear anybody, no, sir.
- 3 Q. Were miners ever reprimanded for reporting a
- 4 safety issue or other concerns? Would they be
- 5 reprimanded by the --- if they had a problem and they
- 6 talked to management about it, would they have any
- 7 reprimands for doing that?
- 8 A. No, not that I'm aware of, sir. And I'd never
- 9 feel uncomfortable about going to talk to them. It
- 10 wouldn't bother at all to go tell them about --- if I
- 11 thought something was unsafe.
- 12 Q. Did this explosion surprise you?
- 13 A. Yes, it did, sir. This is --- compared to Eccles,
- this is not a gassy mine. Yes, all coal mines has a
- 15 little bit. Compared to Eccles, this is not a gassy
- 16 mine. It did surprise me, sir.
- 17 O. Where were you at the time of the accident?
- 18 A. I was at my house. I had been away from the mines
- 19 about 45 minutes, and I had been home about 15 to 20.
- Q. Who notified you or how did you find out?
- 21 A. Roger Cantley called me, the guy that I work with
- 22 outby.
- Q. What did he tell you?
- 24 A. He said, Bill, they've had an explosion at the
- 25 mines. He said there's men trapped or injured or

- dead. He said, we don't know yet. And he said, I'll
- 2 try to keep you posted.
- 3 Q. Do you remember when you were notified
- 4 approximately?
- 5 A. I want to say Roger called me, sir, about 5:30,
- 6 6:00, in that range. It could have been a little
- 7 earlier. I can't really, a hundred percent ---. I
- 8 know that I left the mines at 2:25 that day, in that
- 9 range, and it takes a half-hour to get home. And I
- 10 had probably been home for an hour-and-a-half at
- least, maybe two, and he caught me off guard.
- 12 Q. What time did the company notify you to come to
- work or --- did they notify --- call you that day or
- that night to come up to work on the equipment, the
- 15 mantrips?
- 16 A. Do you mean the day after the explosion?
- 17 Q. Well, even that night, after the explosion.
- 18 A. That night --- I can't recall. I know that I was
- 19 told sometime --- oh, God. I want to say 9:30,
- 20 10:00-ish at night I was asked --- or did I call them?
- I'm trying to remember if I called them, whether I was
- 22 supposed to go to work or not. I think, sir, I called
- them and I got ahold of Paul Thompson, I think it was
- 24 Paul, and he said, wait a minute. And then he come
- 25 back and he said, yeah, Crash, we need you to come on

- in. That's my nickname. I'm sorry. That's what he
- 2 called me. And he goes --- I'm trying to get it as
- 3 close as I can for you. I said, do you want me to
- 4 report at my normal time of 3:00, 3:30? He goes, wait
- 5 a minute. I don't know who he was talking to. He
- 6 said, no. He said, Crash, come in at 6:00 or 7:00,
- 7 probably 7:00. And then ---.
- 8 Q. The next morning?
- 9 A. The next morning. He said, we will need you.
- 10 Roger was already there. They had called --- if I
- 11 understood, they had called Roger in that night. Late
- 12 at night he came down. And then from that point on
- Roger and I were --- until he couldn't handle it no
- more the second week, I worked like 11, 12 days
- straight, 12, 13, 14 hours a day, where everybody else
- was on a four-day rotating shift 12 hours. And they
- 17 said --- they did not make me. They said, if you
- 18 would, yes, we need you and Roger, if you would. But
- I was not, at any time, ordered to work, but I did.
- 20 It was a long 11 days of my life.
- Q. What was your job you did?
- 22 A. Maintaining the rides and trying to get them set
- up, get them ready, if something went wrong help them
- load the water, help them load sand, help them load
- 25 supplies. Whatever they needed us to do, we did it,

- including empty trash, clean up, throw the food out
- where they was bringing so much food in. Can you help
- 3 over here hook power up for the state and hook power
- 4 up for federal. It was just an ongoing --- it was
- 5 like this, it never stopped.
- 6 Q. Are you satisfied working at UBB?
- 7 A. I love it there. I've loved it since I've been
- 8 there. No matter where you work there's going to be a
- 9 little bit of griping. There's going to be little
- things you're not going to like. It always is. And I
- 11 know that because I've worked from Illinois to West
- 12 Virginia, different mines, had my own business for a
- while, and it's just --- there's going to always be
- something. But no, it's --- they've been very good to
- me, and I've got to say that I've never had an
- 16 unpleasant experience with them. In fact, I don't
- 17 think I've ever been scolded by them.
- 18 O. Okay.
- 19 A. You know, some of the stuff --- the only people
- 20 I've ever known that got, you know, let go there were
- 21 these people that were basically really messing up,
- 22 falling asleep at work or something like that.
- 23 ATTORNEY HAMPTON:
- 24 Off the record, please.
- 25 SHORT BREAK TAKEN

- 1 ATTORNEY HAMPTON:
- 2 Back on the record.
- 3 BY MR. GODSEY:
- 4 Q. Has anyone from Massey interviewed you concerning
- 5 your talk today?
- 6 A. Interviewed me concerning this talk?
- 7 Q. Yes.
- 8 A. No, sir.
- 9 Q. You know, you said after the explosion that you
- 10 worked quite often for a long period of time. Did you
- ever feel overwhelmed at how much work you had to do?
- 12 A. No, because I could say no at any time and
- they --- basically they've --- anybody that --- the
- whole time after this accident, anybody that needed
- 15 time off, they'd let them, without any hesitation.
- 16 I've never seen them say no to anybody. I got to say
- Wayne Persinger is a fabulous vice-president, and he
- 18 kind of like runs UBB. And he'll come up and say, can
- 19 you do this or do this? Crash, I need you to do this
- 20 or this. He calls me Bill or Crash. You never know
- 21 what day it's going to be. But no, sir, I --- the
- work I put on myself, I do it myself.
- 23 Q. Do you feel the maintenance department was
- 24 understaffed where you worked?
- A. Well, you're talking about the mines as a whole?

- 1 At UBB?
- 2 O. Yeah.
- 3 A. You know, not really because they were always
- 4 putting on people, more electricians, more trainees.
- 5 No, not really.
- 6 Q. What training did you receive before you first
- 7 went underground at UBB?
- 8 A. Before I first went underground with them?
- 9 Q. Uh-huh (yes).
- 10 A. I was showed the maps. I was showed the
- 11 facilities. I was showed --- given my rescuer. I was
- showed the --- well, basically everything, even
- including where their --- up on the mountain, their
- 14 water towers. They pointed all them out. Homer did
- 15 my talk with him.
- 16 Q. Who is that, Homer ---?
- 17 A. What the heck's his last name? I just know him as
- 18 Homer, sir. He was there a short time. And then ---
- 19 I quess I'm getting ahead of myself. I received a
- 20 one-day orientation with Massey over safety, over
- 21 hazards and stuff like that at the mine, stuff like
- that. The first thing we did is I had to show up for
- 23 paperwork. Once the paperwork --- I think it was 7:00
- 24 a.m. And then we went --- two hours, a couple hours
- 25 there, and then we had to go to the safety building at

- 1 Marfork and we had to watch films and other stuff.
- 2 There was like four or five of us, and safety this and
- 3 that. And then Homer --- at that point I went to the
- 4 mines and reported there. And then he more or less
- 5 showed me, then told me to come back the next day.
- 6 Q. Where did you go in the mine the first time?
- 7 Where did you tour in the mine?
- 8 A. He didn't take me under. He just --- I went to
- 9 the mine site. That first day I didn't go under. The
- 10 second day he put me with John Henline, outby
- 11 electrician, who went --- he more or less runs second
- 12 shift. And I worked for about three months with John
- 13 Henline. And that day he --- me and him went together
- through the mines and we went the north side. We did
- not go on --- they had not opened the south side back
- up other than just fire bossing. It hadn't been
- opened up for coal. John and I would support the
- sections if they needed parts, if a problem happened
- 19 to a belt head, if something here --- a waterline,
- this or that, they needed this. If they lost power,
- 21 we would restore power. For the first three months
- that's what I did, just travel back and forth to the
- 23 mine.
- Q. Did you ever make a --- walk a primary escapeway?
- 25 A. Oh, yes. Several times we had to do that.

- 1 Basically they had us do that when I was on the south
- 2 side. Sometimes they --- we'd work over. And rather
- 3 than wait on a ride, we'd walk it out anyway. But I
- 4 probably --- when I was on the south side from
- 5 December of '08 until about August, late August of
- 6 '09, I worked the south side, third shift, as a
- 7 trainee electrician, and I'll bet you the company made
- 8 us walk the escapeway at least four or five times
- 9 during that time, at least four or five. But we
- 10 probably walked it another dozen walking out the
- 11 primary or the secondary because we didn't want to
- 12 wait on a ride. It was just a common thing.
- 13 Q. Okay. Who was the supply motorman at the mine on
- 14 your shift?
- 15 A. When I first started on second shift, it was
- 16 Pappy --- I don't know his --- I'm sorry. You just
- 17 know these guys' nickname. Droopy and Pappy. I don't
- 18 know their real names. I couldn't tell you, I swear.
- 19 Q. Did they use one or two motors to supply the rock
- 20 dust?
- 21 A. Two. You throwed rock dust in on me. They had
- two motors when they were supplying. Droopy drove one
- 23 and Pappy drove one. The rock dust had a separate
- 24 motor. And the rock dust crew was Rodney and --- I
- 25 can't think of the other one. I'm trying to think of

- who was with him. He was the guy that
- 2 . It will come to me. I can't think of
- 3 his name right now. But Rodney was the main guy.
- 4 When I was on second shift with John during that time
- 5 and for a little while after, Rodney would rock dust,
- 6 and then he ended up going bolting.
- 7 Q. When you were underground there on your days you
- 8 went, did you ever see a pre-shift examiner go through
- 9 the area doing pre-shifting?
- 10 A. Pre-shift examiner?
- 11 O. Yes.
- 12 A. You meant he fire boss?
- 13 Q. Yeah, fire boss.
- 14 A. They were always doing it. Did I actually pay
- 15 attention to them? A couple times when I was working
- three section, we'd have to wait until Jeremy fire
- 17 bossed, Jeremy Burdoff. Most of the other places had
- 18 already been done.
- 19 Q. How about when you were outby, though? Did you
- 20 ever see them ---?
- A. Come by?
- 22 Q. Yeah.
- 23 A. Oh, yeah.
- Q. Are they always in a hurry?
- 25 A. No, not always.

- Q. In other words, did they ever say they didn't have
- 2 enough time to ---?
- A. Oh, they always said that. They always said that.
- 4 ATTORNEY HAMPTON:
- 5 On behalf of MSHA and the Office of
- 6 Miners' Health, Safety and Training, I want to thank
- 7 you for appearing and answering questions today. Your
- 8 cooperation is very important to the investigation as
- 9 we work to determine the cause of the accident. We
- 10 request that you not discuss your testimony with any
- 11 person aside from a personal representative, if you
- 12 had one.
- 13 After questioning other witnesses, we may
- call you if we have any follow-up questions. If at
- any time you have additional information regarding the
- 16 accident that you would like to provide to us, please
- 17 contact us at the contact information that we provided
- 18 to you in the letter. If you wish, you may now go
- 19 back over any answer you have given during the
- 20 interview and you may also make any statement that you
- 21 would like to. Is there anything else that you would
- 22 like to say?
- 23 A. No. I mean, we've covered most of it that I can
- be aware of. I can't think of anything.
- 25 ATTORNEY HAMPTON:

Page 43 Okay. Then again, we would like to thank you for your cooperation. A. If you have any questions, don't hesitate to call me. I mean, call the house, whatever.
