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MR. KOERBER: Let's go on the record. 1 Today is September 20th, 2011. 2 My name is Barry Koerber. I'm the 3 assistant attorney general, and I'm assigned to 4 represent the West Virginia Office of Miners' 5 Health, Safety and Training's UBB Accident 6 Investigation Team. We have several members of the Accident 8 Investigation Teams, to my left. I would ask at this time that they identify themselves. 10 MR. TUCKER: Bill Tucker, with the West 11 Virginia Office of Miners' Health, Safety and 12 Training. 13 MR. BABBINGTON: Matt Babbington, I'm an 14 attorney with the U.S. Department of Labor. 15 I'm Jasey Maggard, with 16 MR. MAGGARD: 17 MSHA. MR. CAUDILL: Steve Caudill, Mine Safety 18 & Health Administration. 19 MR. KOERBER: We also have a court 20 reporter with us here today. She is with the court 21 22 reporter agency, Johnny Jackson & Associates. going to give you their business card at the end of 23 the interview -- well, actually, I'm going to give 24

you this business card just momentarily.

Johnny Jackson & Associates is working under a three-day turnaround, as far as taking the words that are spoken here today and putting them on paper.

Three days would put us through the end of -- the close of the business day on Friday.

So come Monday morning, if you or you and your attorney would like, you can call Johnny Jackson & Associates and ask to have an appointment where you would go to Johnny Jackson's office and review your transcript if you desire.

And the purpose of the review would be whatever you wanted. But one of the things that you would be given is an errata sheet, that if you found any mistakes in the transcript, you could note the errors on the errata sheet.

That is your choice, but I'm going to give you the business card so that if you do choose you'll know how to get in contact with them and the address is here.

The transcript won't be ready until

Monday, and you're not required to call on Monday,

but I would ask that you call within a couple or

three weeks if you desire to review your transcript. Don't wait a year down the road, if you would, please. Try to do it within a couple, three weeks.

Also, if you do choose to review your transcript, you'll have to go to the office.

They'll put you in a conference room where you and your attorney, or you as an individual, would have privacy to read the transcript and review it at your — for however long it took, but you would not be permitted to take a copy home with you. Okay?

THE WITNESS: Okay.

MR. KOERBER: Also, just to assist the court reporter, I would ask that you say the words "yes" and "no" and not "uh-huh," "uh-uh" or shake your head.

I would ask you to please allow the question to be finished before you begin your answer, and I'm going to ask that the interviewers allow you to finish your answer before they begin the next question so we don't have people talking over each other.

Also, if for any reason whatsoever, you want to take a break, just say so and we'll take a

break. 1 THE WITNESS: Okay. 2 MR. KOERBER: Okay. No problem whatsoever 3 any reason whatsoever. 4 We request that you not discuss your 5 testimony with anybody outside of this room other 6 7 than your attorney. THE WITNESS: Okay. 8 MR. KOERBER: And the purpose of that is to protect the integrity of the investigation. 10 At this time, Matt may have something to 11 add, and if so, he can. 12 MR. BABBINGTON: Thank you, Barry. 13 Mr. Ullman, thank you for coming in and 14 talking with us today. 15 I have a letter here addressed to you from 16 Norman Page, our lead accident investigator, MSHA's 17 lead accident investigator, basically describing 18 the background of this interview process and also 19 contact information in case there's additional 20 information you would like to provide at another 21 2.2 time. Thank you, Barry. 23 MR. KOERBER: Not only am I going to give 24

you Johnny Jackson's business card, I'm also going to give you Bill Tucker's business card.

Bill Tucker is the gentleman seated beside me. He's the lead investigator for the state.

If anything comes up after the interview that you would like to add, our contact person is Mr. Tucker.

I'm also going to give you, and I think you've already gotten this in the past when you were here before, but I'm going to give you a memo containing the address to the Board of Appeals, which is the administrative agency that hears coal miner discrimination cases.

If you believe you have been discriminated against because of participating in this interview, this is the agency that you file the complaint with.

THE WITNESS: Okay.

MR. KOERBER: I would caution you that under the statute, you only have 30 days from the day of the discriminatory event to file your complaint.

Also, we have a couple of other people in the back. They are also members of the Accident

Investigation Team. 1 I'm going to ask at this time that they 2 state their name and who they are with. 3 MR. VANCE: Jerry Vance, with MSHA. 4 MR. PAGE: Norman Page, with MSHA. 5 MR. KOERBER: And I'm going to give you 6 7 this stuff here right now. I would ask the court reporter to swear in 8 the witness and I'm going to get to you here in a 10 moment. GLEN T. ULLMAN, JR., DEPONENT, SWORN 11 MR. KOERBER: Sir, for the record, would 12 you please state your full name and spell your last 13 14 name. And you received that 4 in the past; correct? 5 THE WITNESS: Yes. 6 7 MR. KOERBER: Okay. Normally I would offer that as an exhibit at this point in time, but 8 somehow I neglected to put that in my bag this 9 10 morning. So we're not going to do that. At this point in time, I'm going to turn 11 it over to Mr. Tucker to begin the interview. 12 EXAMINATION 13 BY MR. TUCKER: 14 I appreciate you coming in. I want to ask 15 Q. you a few questions to get started here. 16 One thing I noticed on your first 17 interview, you talked about a notebook that you 18 kept on the Ellis side --19 Α. Yes. 20 -- in your locker, and you said that you 21 22 would get it and provide us a copy of that. Did you ever find it? 23 I tried to find it, and they had done 24 Α.

taken everything out of the lockers so I never did 1 I don't have a clue where it's at. aet it. 2 So you did actually go back to the mines? **Q**. 3 Well, I didn't go to Ellis, but I had Α. asked, you know, several people at the mines about 5 getting our stuff, and everything was already taken 6 at the time. So we didn't get any -- other than our boots and hard hat and belts, that's about all 8 we got probably.

- Q. Okay. Have you asked anybody that may have got your notebook to provide it to you?
- A. No. I really don't know who went through the lockers. I don't have no idea.
- Q. One other thing we talked about when it come to fire bossing in your first interview, sometimes you would be maybe running late, and you said that there was several occasions that you held up the oncoming shift?
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. Is that while you were fire bossing or while you was shift foreman?
- A. As I was fire boss. I didn't do a lot of fire bossing when I was a shift foreman, just on occasion.

Right.

Yes.

Q. On your fire boss runs, one of the things
I guess you would look for would be rock dusting?
A. Yes.
Q. Mainly, what areas did you fire boss again

in the mine?

- A. At the time of the explosion, I fire bossed from Ellis punch out inby towards the longwall, and up in the old north mains area there was a pump way up in the face, all that areas and the belts and stuff.
- Q. Okay. So when you was up, say, up in 8

 North, did you walk the same entry up, or do you

 walk up one way and come back a different way? How
 would you do that?
- A. When I would walk my belts, I would walk in the first time I had to do it twice a shift. I'd walk in the first time, and then I'd walk out the same time I fire bossed.
 - Q. As far as on your belts?
- A. Yes. And when I would get, you know, up in that old north mains, the track would go up in there, and there wasn't no running belts up in there. It was just a pump and a D-box at the end of the track. So I would just ride the track up to

that box and then I'd walk up to the pump, which is up in the face.

- Q. Okay. So you would ride most of the way up there?
 - A. For the pump, yes.

- Q. Okay. Did you pay any attention -- I know you was mainly going to that pump instillation just to check it and the D-box, but did you pay any particular attention to the cross-cuts and the other entries up in that area?
- A. Yeah, I would check for bad top and things like that, yeah.
- Q. What about as far as rock dusting? Did you pay particular attention to that?
- A. It was pretty decent. I mean, it wasn't dusted a lot, a lot of the times, but, I mean, it wasn't bad. My --
 - Q. Just wondering when -- I'm sorry.
- A. My floor was, you know, a little dark, but the ribs and top wasn't bad at all.
- Q. When you were in areas like that, would you pay as close attention to the dust as, say, you would on a conveyer belt line? Would you look at that differently?

Yeah, probably would, yes. 1 A. So when you're making the belt line, would 2 0. you pay more attention to the rock dusting in that 3 particular entry than, say, the others? Α. Well, that and track entries. I pay a lot 5 of attention to it. 6 When you were walking the belts, and I 0. know you walked them twice --8 Α. Yes. 10 **Q**. -- in your shift, you had 12-hour shift; is that correct? 11 Α. Yes. 12 When you were walking in the belt entries, 13 Q. did you ever go over into the cross-cuts and pay 14 any particular attention as far as the dusting? 15 I'd go into the cross-cuts as I was 16 17 passing through, yes. Is that something you would write up quite Q. 18 frequently? 19 Yeah, I was pretty stern on my rock 20 dusting. Whenever I would fire boss, I definitely 21 would report it. And if I got the time, I would 22

Q. So in between your runs, you would go back

try to work on it.

23

a lot of times maybe -- or would you go back, in 1 fact, and do some of the rock dusting yourself? I would rock dust and cleaned what I did a 3 lot of when I fire bossed. Did you just hand dust, or did they 5 scatter rock dust out and you hand dust, or how did 6 you do that? Well, if I was going to dust the belts I 8 Α. would have a machine duster, but sometimes I would hand dust heads and tails, places like that. 10 cleaned a place, I would try to hand dust it before 11 I left. 12 So that was mainly at the heads and tails 13 Q. that you would --14 Α. Hand dust. 15 -- typically apply rock dust by hand? 16 Q. 17 Α. Yes. The rest of the belt line, which there's 0. 18 large areas in between the head and tail --19 A. Right. 20 -- who would you rely on to rock dust 21 Q. 22 those areas? At the time the shift foreman was Shawn Α. 23

I reported stuff like that to him, and he

would try to get a crew up with the machine duster, 1 if he could, and they would rock dust the belt with a machine. 3 Did they do that on your shift? Q. Yes, third shift. Α. 5 And I know it's a long time to remember 6 back, but can you recall is that something they would do one or two nights a week, or do you have 8 any --At the time, I really can't remember if 10 they had a dust crew. I know that they always had 11 a dust crew. But at that time, I'm not sure if 12 they had a permanent dust crew that did all the 13 dusting or not. I'm not sure. 14 MR. TUCKER: That's all I have for right 15 I appreciate it. 16 now. 17 EXAMINATION BY MR. MAGGARD: 18 As far as the dust crews go -- let me --19 0. let's step back a little bit. 20 When you first started at Upper Big 21 22 Branch, what was you doing when you first started?

Q. Okay. And what other types of jobs did

Α.

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I was a red hat. I just worked outby.

you have before you became, like, a shift foreman? 1 Α. Just construction work, belt moves, rock dust, belt splices, things like that. 3 And as far as rock dust, was you on the rock dust using the track-mounted duster? 5 Α. Yes. 6 What shift was you doing that on? Q. Α. Third shift. 8 Okay. And how long ago was that prior to Q. 10 April the 5th that you was on the rock dust area? Probably -- I don't know -- seven, eight Α. 11 years, something like that. 12 Did they have more than one shift that had 13 a rock dust crew? 14 Evening shift dusts sometimes. They 15 didn't have a permanent crew, they just had an 16 outby crew and they would help out sometimes. 17 What about closer to April 5th, did they 0. 18 have anybody on evening shift running rock dusting 19 crew? 20 I don't really want to state on it because 21 I ain't really sure. 22 When did you become a shift foreman? 23

understand you was a shift foreman maybe eight

months prior to --

- A. Yeah, I did it for about two years, and decided I just step down, just my choice.
 - Q. Where was you a shift foreman at?
 - A. UBB.
 - O. Was it a section --
 - A. No, the whole hoot owl.
 - Q. Was it third shift?
 - A. Yeah.
- Q. What kind of duties would a third shift foreman have at UBB on third shift?
- A. I would just mainly hand out jobs to all the other men, make sure things got done, checked on everybody, just made sure everything I had them doing was getting done. I just run around checking on different jobs I had going on.
- Q. So was the third shift guy, was third shift foreman, was he responsible for directing the rock dust crew, or was that done by a superintendent or someone else?
- A. The superintendent would leave you notes, and you would just -- it's kind of like passed down the chain. He would leave me notes. I would leave -- I would get -- I mean, on what the note was, and

just hand everything out, prioritize it. 1 And who would that have been when you was 0. the shift foreman, who was directing the rock dust 3 crew? We had several. We had Gary May, we had 5 Α. Rick Foster, and Homer Wallace. 6 On April 5th, who was directing the rock dust crews, do you know? 8 We had Everett Hager and Gary May and Rick 10 Foster. Out of those three, who was the one that 0. 11 primarily done that? 12 Everett Hager was doing that. 13 Could you kind of take us -- let's say --0. 14 I know you was talking about you and another 15 16 examiner, correct me if I'm wrong, was that Bill Campbell that you usually run with him examining 17 the belt? 18

A. Well, we had, you know different — we worked, like, four on, three off schedule. I worked with him sometimes. And then Stevie Campbell was another fire boss with me.

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Q. Okay. Kind of run me through, if you done from the Ellis portal, how far inby you would go,

walking the belts, how you done that, where you 1 stopped at, and just take me through a whole shift, 2 like, the outby, from Ellis inby, and then from the 3 other point the other examiner would start and inby? 5 I would start from Ellis punch out, and I 6 7 would normally come up to 6 North and go to 6 Tail. He would get the longwall belt and inby, and 8 then sometimes we would just rotate. You know, we'd get tired of the same run and just rotate 10 everything once in a while. 11 So if I understand this right, you Ο. 12 normally worked from 6:00 to 6:00; is that correct? 13 Yeah. 14 Α. MR. KOERBER: You mean 6:00 A to 6:00 P? 15 MR. MAGGARD: 6:00 P to 6:00 A. 16 17

Q. And you do, what, two pre-shifts and an on-shift; is that correct?

A. Yeah, I would start my first fire boss run at 8 o'clock.

Q. Okay.

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- A. And my second would start at 3 o'clock.
- Q. Okay. So let's say you done Ellis to the tail of 6 North. The entry that you were

responsible for, did you just walk the belt entry?

A. I would fire boss the belts in. And when I did the outby end of it, I would fire boss my belts in on foot, and he would leave his ride up here.

And I would get -- after I got finished with my run, I would get that ride and I would fire boss the track back outside, and I would fill the fire boss books out before he came out.

- Q. So as far as the pre-shift for day shift on the belts, I understand you're riding the track back out, how did you get the belt entry on the way back out?
- A. Well, I would make myself end up starting outby every time I would -- my fire boss run started, whatever I was doing, when it was time to fire boss, I would be back out at the punch out to start walking back in. I just kind of rotated every time.
- Q. So at the end of your shift, who did you ride out with?
- A. Well, the second run I would finish my run, and his ride would be at the mother drive of the longwall belt. I would go pick him up, up on

Headgate 22, and then we would go fire boss the track on our way out and fill our books out.

Q. But as far as your pre-shift, the pre-shift before owl shift, you called that out or

A. No, I took it to him. One of us did. If he got the outby end, he took it out. If I got the outby end, I took it out. Whichever one of us got that end is the one that took it out.

Q. Where would you have to take -- would you take any kind of methane measurements at certain locations, how did that work?

Where did you take methane measurements, and what was the highest concentration you ever found in the belts?

- A. I would take constant methane all the way in. But in high places where we had fallen and stuff, I would take them there and on the belts, and anywhere I've never had any methane.
- Q. When you say "constant," is there certain times that you look at your detector --
 - A. Yes.

did you take it --

- Q. When did you to that?
- A. Several times. Just a habit I got,

looking at my methane.

Q. Okay. I noticed in the books, and it's not just you, but it's -- several people identified similar conditions. Okay? And I'm going to give you an example of one.

For instance, at 5 North belt from, like, 3/23, March the 23rd, all the way until the time of the accident, there was a notation in there that there was accumulations from Break 60 to the flow through. Okay?

- A. Uh-huh.
- Q. And several people identified that condition.
 - A. Okay.
- Q. Can you tell me a little bit -- I know you said that they were shorthanded on examiners and stuff. Could you tell me a little bit of why a condition would go that long being put in a pre-shift book for the belt?
- A. Neglect. I mean, nobody following up on their job.
- Q. Okay. If I was to tell you that, you know, we've seen those conditions, and I've seen 16 inches of accumulations, the belt turning and the

- -- signs that the belt had turned and accumulations 1 around a couple of rollers in that area, would that 2 surprise you? 3 It really wouldn't surprise me if it was Α. I don't remember that far back, but it 5 there. wouldn't surprise me, no. 6 Who is responsible when you report a 0. condition like that? Who would you expect to take 8 care of that? 10 Well, I would expect the mine foreman to get a crew to clean it up. 11 Q. Who was the mine foreman on Ellis Eagle? 12 On my side of the mines, I was on Ellis 13 14
 - side, and he was acting mine foreman, he just started, you know, right before it was Terry --

can't remember Terry's last name, a black fellow.

Would it be Moore? Q.

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- Yeah, Terry Moore. Α.
- Did you ever see him respond to any of Q. those conditions like that -- or what was Terry's job? What was he doing as far as making resources available to correct the condition?
- At the time of the explosion, I think he spent a lot of time working around where they was

driving through that new headgate.

They was working putting up five-foot belt head and stuff in there at the time of the explosion.

- Q. I know you talked about -- you made mention that -- you mentioned to maybe Chris Blanchard that there was not enough examiners at the mines?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. Do you remember how many times that was mentioned to him? And I'm sure it probably wasn't just you, but could you maybe elaborate on that a little bit?
- A. It was several times we asked for help, and not just me, like you said, every one of us was asking for more people.
- Q. Had any of the -- like Terry Moore or any of the guys that were -- I assume he reviewed the books, right, that you guys filled out?
 - A. Yeah.
- Q. Would he go from time to time and look at those areas?
- A. I don't know if he did. I was third shift so I really don't know.

1 **EXAMINATION** BY MR. CAUDILL: You mentioned earlier as a third shift 3 foreman that you would prioritize your jobs? Α. Yes. 5 You'd get a list from the superintendent 6 **Q**. 7 or whoever? A. Yes. 8 How did you prioritize them? **Q**. Well, at the time I was doing it, the 10 priority was we -- I would go through the fire boss 11 books and see things that had been in there that 12 needed to be corrected and taken out, and I would 13 start with that. 14 Then I would have, you know, rock dust. 15 And I had a crew at the time, so I always had 16 somebody dusting. And just belt splices and things 17 like that, we would just start at the --18 Was it -- I'm sorry. Was it third shift 19 Ο. foreman's job to prioritize these things, or was 20 21 the list given to you in an order? Given to me in an order. 2.2 Α. Given to you in an order? 23 0.

Yes.

Α.

Do you recall where rock dusting fell on 1 Q. that order? It was at the top. I mean, we always rock 3 dusted at the time. That was how long ago? 5 Q. Before the explosion it was about eight 6 months to a year ago, before the explosion. Q. In your pre-shift and on-shift records, 8 you mentioned several times you list, Needs dusted and sometimes spot dusted. 10 Α. Yeah. 11 Do you care to define the difference? 12 0. You know, some places would be dusted 13 fine, and there would be some places that was kind 14 of black and I think they needed some dusting. 15 Okay. Now that's spot dusting or --16 0. Yeah. I mean, if that's what I wrote in 17 Α. the book, that's what I mean, yes. 18 So spot dusting would be a small area --19 Q. A. Yes. 20 -- is what you're saying? 21 Q. 22 A. Yes. And when you put down, Needs dusting, 23 would that be an entire conveyor belt? 24

I would normally write needs dusted from 1 Α. head to tail if they need to dust the whole belt, or if a break needed dusted, I would put that 3 specific break. Now as an examiner, when you recognized 5 these hazards, did you report these hazards to 6 anyone, or did you just record them in the book? A. I would talk about it when we got outside. 8 I would talk to several different people. I would kind of talk to the fire bosses that would be 10 following me and kind of let them know what I had 11 and what was going on. 12 Did you ever report it to management? 13 Q. Yes, I have. 14 Α. And what was their response? 15 Q. They'd get somebody on it or something 16 like that, just different things. I really can't 17 recall certain times. But, I mean, would just get 18 somebody on it is what they'd normally tell you. 19 **EXAMINATION** 20 BY MR. TUCKER: 21 22 0.

Q. I have another just follow-up. We was talking about, like, some of the areas that you travel into other than the belt and the track.

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1	Can you recall any of those adjacent
2	entries there where you'd see any type of
3	additional dusting done, 7, 8 North or any of your
4	side entries?
5	A. There really wasn't honestly no additional
6	dusting done after they come out of there, I don't
7	believe.
8	Q. Just what was applied initially on the
9	belt?
10	A. Yes.
11	MR. TUCKER: Okay. Thank you.

24	had, and you'd keep them in the locker and stuff.

Did you have a lock on your locker? 1 A. No, I didn't. About how soon after the accident did you Q. 3 go to the bathhouse? It was directly -- it was maybe a day or 5 two before they let us go up there. They called me 6 back to work actually, just for any kind of assistance that would be needed up there, I quess. 8 Did you notice any other lockers that had **Q**. already had the locks removed off from them or 10 anything else that you noticed? 11 I don't recall, you know, personally 12 seeing locks removed, but I know everything was 13 taken out. I'm pretty sure of that. 14 You don't have any idea who would have 15 Q. done that? 16 Α. Not at all. 17 0. Did you also have to do anything with 18 explosives in the mines? 19 A. Yes. 20 Could you tell us what -- I know you've 21 **Q**. 22 shot fire and stuff. When have you had to use them, where at? 23

Last time I did use at UBB was in the cut

through between Headgate 22 and Tailgate 22. 1 was a rock fall on the tail entry and they had me to shoot it. That was the last time I done it. 3 Do you know how long prior to the 5th that 4 would have occurred? 5 It wasn't long at all. 6 Was there a magazine up there that you Q. remember? 8 Α. Yes. 10 0. Was you involved with bringing that magazine in, or was it already there? 11 Α. I think I might have brought it in and it 12 was never taken out to my knowledge, so ... 13 Do you know if they had any permissible 14 0. blasting units at the mines, or did you know what 15 type they had? 16 You mean the magazines for outside? 17 Α. To initiate the blast, the battery pack? 0. 18 Oh, yes. I don't recall what it was 19 called, but we had a battery explosive. 20 0. Do you know if it was permissible or not? 21 A. I don't know. It was -- I really don't 22 know. 23 Do you know where it was normally stored 24 Q.

at?

- A. When I used it, I would take it in with me and I'd take it back out into the office.
 - O. Which office?
- A. At the time I would figure it would have been on the Ellis side. I didn't go to the UBB side very often unless I had to go get the magazine to get powder.
- Q. When you were doing your exams and stuff, did the operator issue you a multi-gas detector?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. So they issued it, it wasn't your own or anything like that?
 - A. No, they issued it.
- Q. Okay. Do you know what -- had you had any -- I know we talked about how much methane you read. Did they give you any kind of training on that detector?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Could you tell us when did they give you some training?
- A. I don't recall the exact time, but the last time that I was trained on it would be at my it would have been at my retraining course that

we would go through every year. 1 Do you know about what time that was? Q. A. I really can't remember at that time, no. 3 How long had they issued you a detector at Q. UBB? 5 I don't understand. Α. 6 7 How long had you had a detector? Did you 0. have take it home? Just tell me a little bit about 8 it. 10 They kept them stored. They had chargers there and they had bumpers and all that stuff. 11 had to bump it every shift. 12 Did you normally use the same one that you 13 14 always --Α. No. 15 Q. Okay. 16 No, I didn't. 17 Α. How many spares did they have? We've been 18 Q. told that there was a shortage of them at the 19 20 mines? 21

A. I don't know exactly. There was several.

I always had one, but I don't know exactly how many they had, no.

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23

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Q. Did you calibrate them, or did somebody

else do that?

- A. I would take care of mine. I would calibrate it -- we had a little setup in our fire boss room there, and we bumped them every shift and we would calibrate them, things like that.
- Q. Do you know how many -- I'm trying to figure out how many spares they did have. Do you know how many spare detectors they had there?
- A. I really don't know at the time. I mean, maybe there might have been about ten detectors there. I ain't really a hundred percent exact. I know there was several.
- Q. Most of the examiners we talked to actually took their detectors home with them and charged them, and they were issued one individually. Are you telling me that you weren't --
- A. I would just get mine when I went to work. I never did take it home.

EXAMINATION

21 BY MR. CAUDILL:

Q. You mentioned the notebook in your locker and that you traveled to the mine and you asked them?

1 A. Yes.

- Q. Who were you referring to when you said "them"?
- A. I think Everett Hager was up there at the time, and, I mean, there was several people there that I don't have a clue who they was.

But it was just a question I asked, and the lockers was already cleaned out at the time so nobody really had an answer.

- Q. What did they tell you?
- A. I can't recall exactly what they said. I don't know. I just know our lockers there was just a couple of us came back to assist a couple Massey people and things like that that was there, and I don't even know who them people was. I just know they was something to do with Massey.

And everything was out of our lockers is all I remember. I don't know what they done with it or who got it or anything.

- Q. You also stated that we went up there and asked them. Was there someone else with you?
- A. Billy Campbell was with me when I went back.
 - Q. Billy Campbell was with you?

And John -- I can't remember John's last 1 Α. He was another fire boss. He had just started there a few months before the explosion, an 3 older man. Did they also ask for their personal 5 Q. belongings out of their lockers? 6 I don't know. Α. Q. Did they ever talk to you about it? 8 No. Α. 10 Q. You also mentioned while you were doing your fire bossing that you held up the production 11 crew --12 Yes. 13 Α. -- to complete your fire boss run. 14 Q. What caused you to run late that day? 15 Shorthanded. 16 Α. Shorthanded? 17 Q. Yeah, certain times I would have --18 Α. somebody maybe would call in or something, and I'd 19 have a lot more to fire boss than I normally would, 20 21 so ... 22 Q. Did you ever ask for additional help? Α. Yes. 23 What was the response that you got? 24 Q.

1	A. They thought we had plenty at the time.
2	Q. Who did you talk to about this?
3	A. I talked to Everett Hager and Gary May.
4	Chris Blanchard, I've talked to him several times
5	about it.
6	Q. Now if I understand you correct, you were
7	traveling from the Ellis portal all the way up to
8	the north section
9	A. 6 North.
10	Q walking that area?
11	A. From punch out to 6 North tail or I would
12	get the from 6 North tail inby.
13	Q. And you made that trip how many times a
14	night?
15	A. Two times.
16	Q. Two times a night?
17	A. Yeah.
18	Q. And you had enough help?
19	A. I didn't think so.
20	Q. Do you feel like that's a whole lot for
21	one person to try to examine?
22	A. Yes.
23	

EXAMINATION

BY MR. MAGGARD:

- Q. If I was to ask you which belts had the worst conditions, could you, you know, from your memory, which belts would you say were in need of extra attention?
- A. I would say Ellis belt. Ellis 4 and 5 belt.
- Q. I understand they had a lot of gob outs in 4 North tail. Is that what you're talking about?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. What about in by 78 Break, in by the switch?
 - A. Those belts was normally in good shape.
- Q. Can you explain why that -- I know he asked about it, why there's so many entries about needing additional dust, spot dust, clean up here and there, why are there so many entries by so many different examiners in your opinion? Is it because they couldn't keep up with you?

I want you to kind of clarify what you mean by they were in pretty good shape when you got --

A. I mean compared to what I was talking

about, the Ellis belts, they was in a lot better 1 shape than what they was in. Would you say that along 5 North belt, 3 would you say it's -- the conditions inby 78 were the same or a little bit worse? 5 Maybe a little worse than 5. Α. 6 **EXAMINATION** BY MR. CAUDILL: 8 When you record, Needs dusting, what did 10 you use to determine that an entry needed dusted, visual examinations? 11 Yeah, visual examinations, black ribs and 12 black top, you know, it would have black dust on 13 them, or kind of like an air lock would do. 14 Would you classify that as, like, float 15 **Q**. coal dust then? 16 Α. Yes. 17 Now, Mr. Maggard has already mentioned 0. 18 that "needs dusting" is repeated over and over and 19 over in these belts. 20 Did you ever question management as to why 21 22 these weren't getting corrected? Sometimes if it was carried over in the 23 book several times I would bring it to their 24

attention more than one time. 1 I know just looking through these belt examination book it repeats, and it's not just you, 3 it's additional -- other examiners do the same thing. 5 You mentioned the north area is not being 6 dusted all the time? 7 A. Right. Yes. 8 Right there where the pump was? Q. 10 Α. Yes. Q. How often did you ever see that area 11 dusted? 12 After they came out of there, never to my 13 Α. attention. 14 How many dust crews were you guys running 15 Q. on third shift? 16 Α. Just one. 17 O. Just one? 18 We'd have two men. 19 Would you ever know of them having any 20 Q. problems with the rock duster? Was it --21 A. Yeah. 22 How often was it broke down? 0. 23

Well, we had two. We always would have

24

Α.

1	one running, but they had a lot of maintenance
2	problems out of them. They needed to be rebuilt.
3	Q. Old machines?
4	A. Uh-huh, yes.
5	Q. How old were they, do you know?
6	A. They was there when I got there, so I
7	really don't know how old they are.
8	Q. What kind of condition were they in when
9	you arrived?
10	A. They was in real good condition when I
11	started.
12	Q. That was, what, eight
13	A. Eight or nine years.
14	Q. Eight or nine years?
15	A. Uh-huh.
16	Q. To your knowledge, had any rebuilds been
17	done to them in that time frame?
18	A. I think they rebuilt the orange we had
19	an orange one and a white one. I think they
20	rebuilt the orange one at one time in between that.
21	EXAMINATION
22	BY MR. TUCKER:
23	Q. Did you ever travel up the tailgate of the
24	current longwall?

Towards inby 78? 1 Α. Inby 78, yeah, the tailgate entries of the Q. 2 longwall. 3 Α. I have before, yes. About how long has it been before you had 5 Q. been up through there? 6 7 Α. Before the explosion, it had been a 8 while. Been a while? Q. Yeah. 10 Α. Okay. 11 Q. I think it was when they was driving that 12 Α. tailgate, when they was driving it up, I believe. 13 Okay. Was that before Bandytown fan was 14 Q. online? 15 I believe so, yes. 16 Α. Okay. What about this connector down in 17 Q. through here right below the longwall stop? Had 18 you been in there recently prior to the explosion? 19 A. I'd say I have, yes. 20 Can you recall a condition of rock dust in 21 Q. that area? 22

A. Not really. It's been so long ago I really ...

1 MR. TUCKER: Okay. Thank you. 2 **EXAMINATION** 3 BY MR. MAGGARD: We was talking about those -- that rock 4 0. 5 dust crew. I know you worked third shift. How 6 many times would you see them on a -- if they made 7 it into your area was it -- how many trips did they 8 make this far deep up in the mines, say, up 6 9 North, 7 North? 10 I've done it. When I done it, I'd make 11 two or three a night. But the guys that they had 12 at the time would make a trip usually. 13 How long would they normally be in an 0. 14 area, do you know? 15 They would normally dust one belt a Α. 16 shift. When they was dusting it would be -- you **17** know, say they dust 4 North, they usually dusted 18 that belt. 19 We've had different ones say they could do 20 10 cross-cuts, some say 20. Could they really do a whole belt? 21 22 Α. With a load of dust you mean? 23 Yeah. 0. 24 They couldn't do a whole belt with one A.

1 load of dust.

- Q. Okay. How thick was those guys applying the rock dust when they put it down, do you know?
 - A. I don't know exactly, but I'd say they was just whitening everything up more than likely.
 - Q. Had anybody -- I know you said you had been on the rock dust crew. Did anybody give you any training on how much rock dust to apply in the area?
 - A. I was trained really well on it when I done it. These other guys, I don't know.
 - Q. Do you remember who trained you?
 - A. Dave Petry was my foreman at the time.
 - Q. Do you recall what he told you about rock dusting?
 - A. He went with me several times before he, you know, let us have it, so he done a good job on showing us how to run it and how to apply it and all that.
 - Q. I know you was talking about when you first started pre-shift and that somebody went with you for a couple of days. Who would that have been when you started pre-shifting the belts?
- A. That would just have been another fire

- boss, I'd say. Whoever was fire bossing at that
 time.
- 3 Q. You don't recall who that would have been?
- 4 A. No, I don't.

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- Q. What was the purpose of him traveling with you, to show you locations or what, can you explain?
- A. Show me what to look for, show me where pumps and stuff was at, and things like that.
- Q. Did anybody from the safety department at any time go ever what you should be looking for during a pre-shift?
- 13 A. No.
- Q. What about any of the superintendents or mine foreman?
- A. No. They would send me to the fire boss
 when I first started doing it.
 - Q. Is there anything else that -- I mean, I know you done a notebook. Was there anything that you would have put in that notebook that wouldn't be on a pre-shift report or you didn't think needed to be put in it?
- A. No. Only reason I carried my notebook is

 so I would remember what I needed to put in my book

1 when I got outside.

- Q. Would there be any reason why that book —
 if it was given to you, if the person that cleaned
 out the lockers was to get, you know, they were to
 give you that book, is there any reason you
 wouldn't give it to the Accident Investigation
 Team?
- A. No, no. Just like I said, I carried it to -- so I would remember what I fire bossed and, you know, if I needed to do something, I would remind myself with it.
- Q. I know you said you was getting detectors from out at, I guess, was that Ellis portal where you was getting them at --
- A. Yes.
 - Q. -- to do your examination?

During your fire boss runs with that detector, did you ever run into an occurrence it wasn't charged sufficiently and it ran out of charge and you had to turn it off, maybe turn it back on during your exam? Because you're a little different than a lot of other examiners that actually took theirs home and actually charged them their self.

1	A. I never had any of them to go dead on me,
2	no.
3	Q. I know some of them had commented that,
4	you know, they would work that 12-hour shift that
5	you worked, that they were having some problems
6	keeping them charged. So are you saying that you
7	didn't have that problem with it?
8	A. No, I didn't. Mine never did go dead.
9	Q. Was you normally getting the same detector
10	every time, or was you getting a different one?
11	How many different ones was you using?
12	A. I would just go in and grab one and bump
13	it for that shift. I didn't really pay attention
14	to which one I was getting.
15	MR. KOERBER: Let's take a two-minute
16	break, and let's go off the record for just a
17	couple minutes and we'll be right back.
18	(Break.)
19	MR. KOERBER: Let's go back on the record
20	and finish up.
21	EXAMINATION
22	BY MR. CAUDILL:
23	Q. During your examination of the belts as a
24	fire boss, did you ever shut the belts down?

1 Yeah. Α. 2 And what for? 0. 3 A hot roller. I remember one time we had 4 a hot roller and I shut it down to change that. 5 If I had a broken roller or something, I would shut the belts off and take the roller out, 6 7 or a stuck roller or anything like that. 8 0. Did you ever shut them down for any type 9 of accumulations, float coal dust? Yeah, I have. Several times the tail 10 11 piece would be gobbed off, or there would be 12 rollers rolling in a gob, I would shut them off when I went to knock it down. 13 14 Is that something you would record in the Q. 15 book? I don't recall. I don't know. Probably 16 Α. **17** not. 18 0. Would you perceive that as a hazard? 19 Yeah. Α. 20 Would you think that would be something Q. 21 you should record in the book? 22 Α. Yeah. 23

1	EXAMINATION
2	BY MR. MAGGARD:
3	Q. Had you ever been instructed on putting
4	that kind of material in the book?
5	A. No, I haven't. Like I said, they would
6	just show me where to go, what to look for when
7	they trained me.
8	Q. So have you ever had anybody go over the
9	regulations pre-shifts and on-shifts with you at
10	Performance or UBB?
11	A. Just the fire boss would show me how to
12	fill my books out when I first started.
13	EXAMINATION
14	BY MR. CAUDILL:
15	Q. Now during your fire boss duties, were you
16	also required to shovel belt?
17	A. I would work on whatever needed to be done
18	the most. I would shovel, or I'd even a lot of
19	times they'd have me go shoot the top somewhere or
20	make belt splices.
21	Q. Okay. Did you guys have a belt shoveling
22	crew, a crew that came in and cleaned the belts?
23	A. Yeah, we had a crew that shoveled belt and
24	changed rollers stuff like that

- 1 Q. What shift did they work?
- A. Third shift.
- Q. What if you had an accumulation build up
- 4 during the shift? I've worked in the mines and,
- 5 you know, a belt run off the track or whatever and
- 6 | spill?
- 7 A. Right.
- 8 Q. How do you address that?
- 9 A. Well, if it wasn't rolling in the gob, I
- 10 | would report it. But if something was rolling, I
- 11 would shut the belts off and clean them up.
- Q. Do you recall who was working that third
- shift belt crew that you just mentioned?
- 14 A. Lacey Cox. He was like a crew leader, I
- 15 guess you'd call him. And then he had two men with
- 16 him.
- Q. Two belt shovelers?
- 18 A. Yeah.
- 19 Q. For the entire months?
- 20 A. Yeah.
- Q. Do you feel that's enough?
- 22 A. No.
- Q. Did you ever tell mine management that
- 24 | they needed to get more belt shovelers?

- No, I really didn't ever address it. A.
- 2 When you had talked to them about the 0. 3 accumulations that you recorded in the book, you didn't make mention of it? 4
 - I would let them know what needed to be done, but I wouldn't comment on them needing more men for that job.

EXAMINATION

BY MR. MAGGARD:

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- There was some contractors that had gotten 11 laid off recently before April the 5th. Do you 12 know why those guys and how many were laid off at 13 that time?
 - They do that every year. They would get us several contractors, and then they would start laying people off. A lot of times it was around Christmastime. At that time, I don't remember who it would be.
 - Would that affect the conditions of the 0. belts? Or was some of those guys working on the Tell us a little bit about that. belts?
- 22 Α. They would be doing several different 23 Some of them would be on a move crew, some things. 24 of them would be outby, like you say, but they just
